Post Office Slates New Building Move

The U. S. Post Office at WSMR will begin moving into a new home this weekend.

From the headquarters building which it has occupied more than seven years, the WSMR station will move to the new Battalion Administration and Supply building, No. 153, which has just been completed. The move awaits only the completion of a brand-new counter like the one in the bank.

With 2,237 square feet of space and four big rooms to work in, the post office expects that service can be improved considerably.

515th Ord Moves In; 9th Departs By Railroad

The 515th Ordnance Company (Special Weapons and Missile) (Depot Support) is the newest member of the White Sands Missile Range family.

Activated for the fifth time in its 17-year-long history especially for this assignment — the 515th has replaced the 9th Ordnance Company which cleared the missile range Wednesday by a rail troop movement from the Las Cruces railroad station.

The 9th, activated Dec. 14, 1958, at a parade and color capping ceremony here which signaled the inactivation of the predecessor 14th Ordnance Battalion, will complete the first stage of its movement to Germany when the Las Cruces rail movement closes on the USNS Darby at Brooklyn Army Terminal, with the Company Headquarters installed aboard.

DARBY SAILS

The Darby sails tomorrow. The 515th, less the Security Platoon, and Missile Storage Platoon, commanded by Maj. Robert H. Blackburn, underwent the fifth activation of its history at Sandia Base, Albuquerque, N. M. under the major's command on May 15 of last year to

begin its training for its duties here.

Exactly a year later three non-commissioned officers and 25 other ranks of the company arrived here as advance party. The Security Platoon formed and trained at the Military Police Training Center, Ft. Gordon, Ga., was activated by the Department of the Army and joined the parent company here, at strength, on June 1, under command of Second Lt. Robert C. Laws.

Post Kindergarten Seeks Teacher

The Missile Storage Platoon was activated at Ft. Bliss, Tex., last September, and joined the Company as individuals and small groups.

YEAR OF TRAINING

During the year of its present activation the 515th underwent individual and unit training under the Unit Training Division, Special Weapons Training Group, Field Command, of the Armed Forces Special Weapons Project, at Sandia Base. Before moving to its first assignment at the missile range it successfully passed the Organizational Maintenance Inspection of the Inspector General, Field Command, of the Special Weapons Project. The passing of the inspection verifies that the unit is ready to perform a mission.

The movement of the Headquarters and Special Weapons platoons, with their equipment, from Sandia Base, was made in organic transportation.

SOUTHWEST VET

Maj. Blackburn is a widely experienced ordnance officer and a veteran of the service in New Mexico and the southwest. A native of Spartanburg, S. C., he was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant. (Continued on Page 8)

Watch U.S. 70 Stretch

The New Mexico State Police and the missile range's provost marshal are shaping the teeth in driving regulations in an attempt to cut the growing number of accidents involving commuter traffic to and from Las Cruces and WSMR.

A rigid watch will be maintained over the long lines of morning and evening traffic all along Highway U. S. 70 between the range access road and the Las Cruces city limits.

Both law enforcement agencies have requested increased cooperation by the thousands of drivers who use the highway each work day.

VIOLATIONS CHECKED

Specific violations which will be stamped out before tragedy makes the efforts too late include speeding in general, exceeding the 45 mile an hour limit in the present construction zone, following too closely and driving recklessness that could result in the piling up of a dozen or more cars.

State Police surveillance of driving habits will be conducted through the use of uniformed officers in police cars, observers in unmarked cars, and the tell-tale radar that registers speeders scientifically.

In asking cooperation of all drivers in making the missile range traffic safe even during peak hours, State Police spokesmen say "The largest majority of White Sands Missile Range drivers has been giving us good cooperation, but a careless or unthinking minority has been causing an increasing number of accidents that involve innocent drivers and passengers."

WSMR Provost Marshal Lt. Col. Howard Wells has promised to make things even tougher for those drivers who feel they need not cooperate.

A shuffle of top-ranking sergeants at WSMR took place this week.

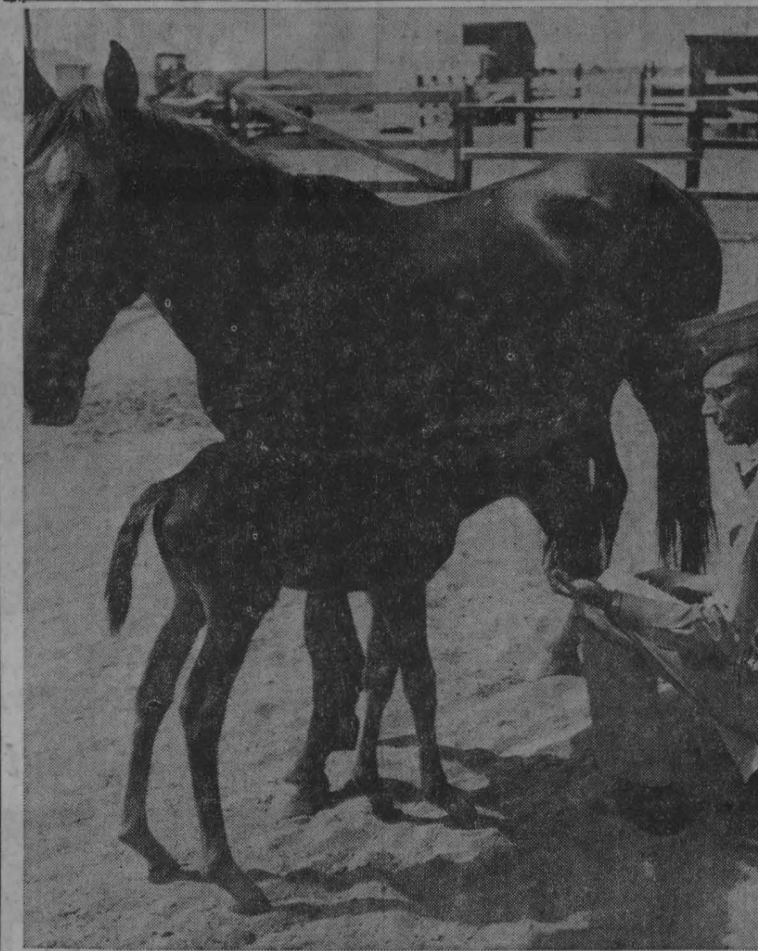
M/Sgt. Francis E. Blakslee, since October, 1955, stationed at WSMR for the second time, became Sergeant Major in the Adjutant Division June 15.

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Torch Still Burning Bright In Hand Of 'Miss Liberty'

Little old lady she certainly isn't — height 152 feet; weight 450,000 pounds — but she's just passed her 75th birthday without adding a wrinkle through the years. What would New York Harbor be without Miss Liberty?

France gave Bartholdi's giant statue in steel and copper to this country as a symbol of Franco-American friendship. Since then she has been our ally in two World Wars and the Korean "police action." And we, in turn, have proved our deep gratitude to the nation that helped us achieve our independence.

As for the Statue of Liberty, it is an inspiration both for Europeans seeing our shores for the first time and for Americans returning from abroad. 515th Unit History Dates Back To 1924

The present 515th Ordnance Company, (Special Weapons Missile) (Depot Support) has a unit history dating back to 1924, when it was activated as Motor Repair Section No. 14, of the 7th Infantry Division, VII Corps Area.

It became a company May 1, 1936 — Company B, 37th Quartermaster Battalion. Transfer of the Army's motor vehicles to Ordnance responsibility in 1942 brought redesignation as Company B, 73rd Ordnance Medium Maintenance Battalion.

Later the same year it began its history as a separate company: 3430th Ordnance Medium Maintenance Company, and was redesignated Medium Automotive Maintenance Company in 1943.

At Ft. Lewis, Wash., it first became the 515th, on April 1, 1947, and six years later became the 515th Company, (Direct Support) when the Medium Automotive Maintenance Company designation was discontinued, and was inactivated Dec. 20, 1954, at Eighth U.S. Army, in Korea.

Activated Guided Missile Direct Support, Corporal, at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., in 1955, it saw service at Ft. Bliss, Tex., and at the Red Canyon Range. Its last inactivation took place at Ft. Sill, Okla., Nov. 15, 1957.

Its last activation was at Sandia Base, N. M., as a Guided Missile—Special Weapons Depot Company.

The company is assigned to Troop Command, and placed under operational control of the chief of Ordnance Mission.

Robbery Charges Filed Against Four Soldiers

Ft. Bliss authorities have taken military jurisdiction over four White Sands Missile Range soldiers charged in El Paso with robbery by assault.

The four men were charged by El Paso police following questioning concerning the hold-up of a San Francisco engineer last Sunday evening.

The quartet held under Ft. Bliss jurisdiction, since WSMR does not have military authority in the El Paso area, are Ronald E. Cain, Johann W. Lieser, Bobby Joe Fausett and Robert E. Fant. All are assigned to Detachment 4.

The engineer, George S. Hearn, told police he was forced into an automobile at Mesa St. and Main Dr. in El Paso at about 11:30 Sunday night and was driven to a remote area where his ring, watch and \$25 to \$30 in cash were taken from him.

He was then taken to the Ramada Inn, where he was a guest, and was forced to cash a check for \$60. He was then released.

The four men were questioned about the hold-up after two El Paso policemen spotted their car parked near the Greyhound Bus depot.

The robbery by assault charges followed.

First X-15 Free Flight Successful

EDWARDS AFB, Calif. (AFPS)

— The X-15 rocket plane performed perfectly in its first free flight as it dropped seven miles in a five-minute unpowered glide to the Mojave Desert here June 8.

Released by its B-52 "mother ship" from a position under the right wing, the 50-foot-long bullet-shaped X-15 was subjected to the free flight to test its stability and handling control.

Upon release from the mother ship, the rocket plane executed a cross-country "lazy S" pattern which had been calculated in advance to end up over the landing area.

The lower of four big rudders, which are spaced around the tail 90 degrees apart, was jettisoned just before landing to make room for the landing skids to emerge.

Landing at 185 m.p.h. on the hard-baked-alkali floor of nearby Rosamond Dry Lake, the X-15 skidded 4,600 feet before coming to a halt. The lake bed was used rather than a runway here because it provided a wide expanse 12 miles long.

Designed to fly at speeds of 4,000 m.p.h. and altitudes of 100 miles or higher, the X-15 is the product of a four-year research problem. The project is a joint venture of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, the Navy and the Air Force.

Produced by North American Aviation, Inc., of Los Angeles, the X-15 made four "captive" flights slung under the right wing of a B-52 prior to the free flight test. The rocket plane is designed for aerial launchings and unpowered landings to save fuel.

Signal Corps Observes 99th Year

As the Army Signal Corps major investment in the field of guided missiles, the U.S. Army Signal Missile Support Agency tomorrow will celebrate the 99th Anniversary of the founding of the corps.

The Signal Agency will observe its seventh birthday at White Sands Missile Range along with the Signal Corps Anniversary with a parade tomorrow morning and an Open House in the Officers Open Mess in the afternoon. The past year has seen the increasingly close identification of the Signal Agency with missile testing and development. In recent months, the Agency has been assigned primary responsibilities for all Signal Corps research and development in missiles.

SMALL START

In 1946 a team of 10 men and two radar vans came to White Sands on TDY from the Army Signal Research and Development Laboratory at Fort Monmouth, N.J. The mission of this team was to provide radar tracking and communications in the firing of the captured German V-2 rockets on a range that was to sprawl over 4,000 square miles.

This group was expanded as the missile testing program grew, and in 1949 was designated as Field Station No. 1 of the Army Signal Research and Development Laboratory. The organization was established as an agency three years later.

The first commanding officer in 1952 was Col. Earle F. Cook, who was promoted to brigadier general and became chief of Research and Development in the office of the chief Signal officer. He is now acting deputy chief signal officer.

McGOVERN DEPARTS — Until a week ago, the Signal Agency was commanded for a

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19 month period by Col. John P. McGovern, who has departed for an assignment in Orleans, France.

The new commanding officer is Col. Paul W. Albert, the former deputy commander of the Signal Laboratory at Fort Monmouth.

The Signal Agency established a detachment at Fort Churchill, Canada, to support the International Geophysical Year rocket firings at the Hudson Bay post.

Detachments of the Agency were established on a world-wide basis in Hawaii, the Philippines and Eritrea to conduct a classified mission.

During this extensive period of growth, the most significant technical advance made by the Signal Agency came during this past year with the installation of the first two AN/FPS-16 precision radars at White Sands Missile Range.

These radars, integrated into the five station chain radar system operated by the Signal Agency, provide an accuracy in supersonic missile tracking offered by no other electronic instrument.

The FPS-16 radars yield trajectory data immediately after the missile shoot, eliminating the need for missile evaluation personnel to wait days for this information.

This revolutionary radar works in darkness, during conditions of cloud clutter, and in atmospheric environmental situations that would hamper ordinary radar.

PIONEERS — As an agency of the corps that developed the military airplane and radar, and established the first Army Weather Service, the Signal Agency has pioneered during the past year in many fields in addition to communications-

electronics support of missile firings.

The Signal Missile Support Agency went into the shooting end of the business with an intensive series of rocket firings to obtain atmospheric measurements as high as 120 miles. This information is being obtained for the use of computers associated with the guidance mechanisms of intercontinental ballistic missiles.

The Agency has adapted its frequency monitoring stations to record transmissions of all U.S. and U.S.S.R. satellites. Valuable data is being recorded for the national agencies engaged in this field.

multimillion dollar instrumentation system in the high speed test track at the Air Force Development Center.

A system was perfected to track missiles by acoustic means. Engineered by personnel of the Missile Geophysics Division, the system is designated SOTIM (Sonic Observation of the Trajectory and Impact of Missiles). It is heavily in demand by range users to locate impacted missiles.

And on August 19, 1958, by General Order No. 30, Department of the Army, the close identification of this organization with the field of guided missiles was officially recognized with the redesignation as the U.S. Army Signal Missile Support Agency.

Tomorrow the Signal Agency celebrates another anniversary of effort in the Signal Corps tradition of "serving the Army and the Nation."

Women's Corps Ends Survival Training

White Sands Missile Range has its first Volunteer Women's Corps.

A class of 85 women, including 10 from Las Cruces, completed last week the first women's defense training course to be given at the missile range and formally organized to become part of the WSMR Military Emergency Disaster Force.

Elected officers for the official Volunteer Women's Corps are Mrs. Donald Clark, corps commander; Mrs. W. E. Gittleman, assistant corps commander; Mrs. S. D. Cozby, operations officer; Mrs. R. E. Cooksley, control party commander; Mrs. C. N. Allain, supply officer, and Mrs. K. L. Lewis, decontamination station commander.

The six-week training course included instructions in nuclear warfare, decontamination, biological and chemical agents and survival. The last session was devoted to practical exercises including use of gas masks and familiarization with gases.

Hawaii Elections Set For June 27

NEW YORK (APFS) — Servicemen-citizens of Hawaii, who have been previously registered, may vote in their first state primary election on June 27.

Candidates to be nominated include: two U.S. Senators, one U.S. Representative, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and all 76 members of the State Legislature.

THE MOST POPULAR spectator sport in America today is horse racing. In 1958 attendance in the United States climbed to over 44 million, leading even baseball in total admissions.

From the days when southern plantation owners matched their thoroughbreds in private match races, racing in this country has grown to a billion-dollar passtime with some 80-odd tracks scattered across the country.

There are approximately 1,200 breeding farms in 46 states, with more than 20,000 horses in training. There are 64 breeding farms in Texas alone, and, of course, this year's Kentucky Derby was won by **Tommy Lee**, owned by **Fred Turney, Jr.** of Midland, Texas. Racing also creates business for other industries. Each year the upkeep of horses in training, including feed, medicine, travel and other expenses comprise a bill totaling more than \$85,000,000.

SINCE THE LATE 1800's, the Kentucky Derby has been an annual event of nationwide interest, and other famous stake races, such as the **Preakness** and **Belmont Stakes**, date back as far as 83 years. Each year these and other famous races attract millions of television viewers throughout the country.



Since the turn of the century, the race meetings at such famous tracks as **Saratoga** and **Belmont** have been numbered among the nation's leading social occasions, patronized by governors, ambassadors, congressmen, industrial leaders, and hundreds of thousands of others in all walks of American life. The present governor is the ninth chief executive of Maryland who has been president of the **Pimlico Jockey Club**.

MANY OF THE MEN and families who have helped make this country great have been ardent patrons of racing, both as owners of racing stables and as patrons of the track. How do the scores of race-tracks in 24 states affect the communities in which they are located? Here are typical opinions from around the country:

Oliver W. Roberts, General Manager of the **Omaha Chamber of Commerce** says: "It is of substantial influence in bringing business to Omaha. There is no noticeable increase in law violations; the track is well policed and extremely well run. Race-track followers have not been a serious problem. We feel the track is beneficial."



From the **Louisville, Kentucky, Chamber of Commerce**: "We have had racing here for nearly 100 years. The spring and fall meetings bring hundreds of cars to Louisville daily from as far away as 200 miles. They shop and often stay over for several days in our hotels. We have not noticed any increase or decrease in law violations during the racing meetings."

THE **NEW ORLEANS** Chamber of Commerce reports that the local track is a "... definite asset to the tourist trade. No noticeable effect as to an increase or decrease in law violations in New Orleans."

From the **Raton, New Mexico, Chamber of Commerce**: "If Raton retailers have a collection problem . . . it certainly is not apparent. We have talked with our police chief in regard to the track's possible influence on law violations and it is his opinion that the existence of **La Mesa Park** has no apparent effect on local crime." Evidence that **Raton** considers its racing plant a great asset is the fact that the **Raton Chamber of Commerce** puts on a good-will tour to publicize the opening of the track each season.

Other factual aspects of "The Sport of Kings" will be presented in future advertisements of **Sunland Park**, where modern, scientifically supervised racing will come — for the first time — to the **Sunland** area, starting **October 9th**.

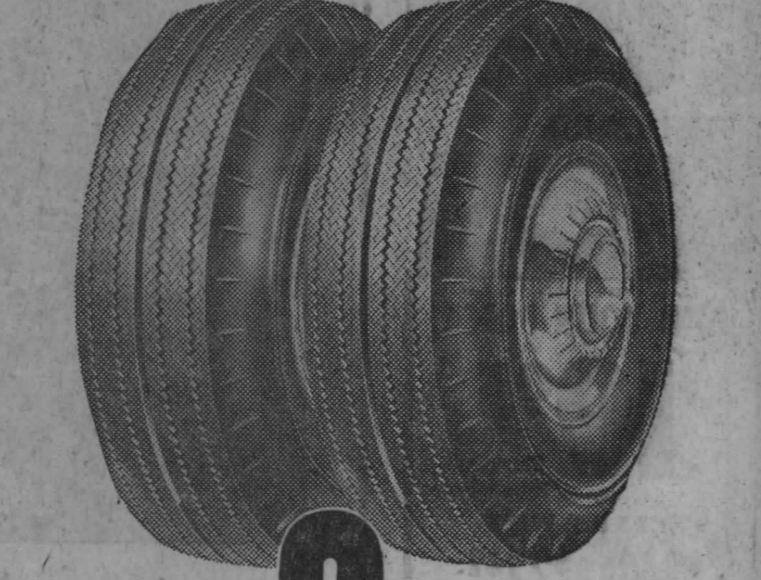

A near shut-out game was pitched by south paw Pep Blackburn of the 515th Rascals against the MP Zeus in a five-inning thriller in the peanut league.

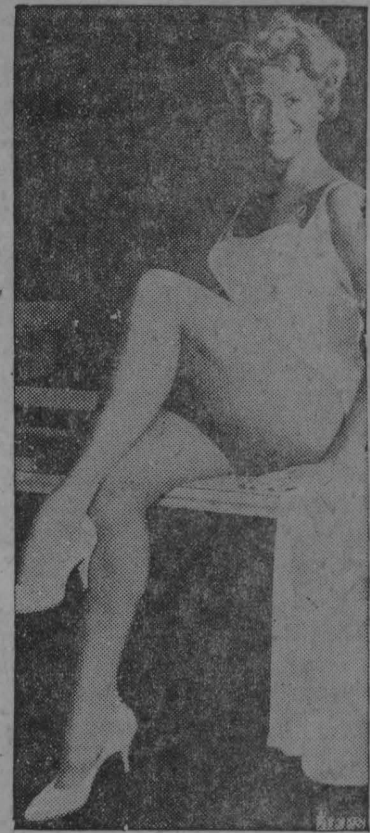

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*Eggs In Space Show
Proof Of Cell Growth*

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. — Results from the Army's egg fertilization experiment flown in a Jupiter IRBM nose cone recently indicate that the material tested survives and continues to develop during flight-through outer space.

Dr. Richard S. Young, biologist in the Army Ballistic Missile Agency's Research Projects Laboratory, sponsor of the project, said the outcome was "generally encouraging."

This experiment using sea urchin eggs was one of five test tube experiments flown in addition to the two monkeys. All were successfully recovered. The bio-medical experiments were conducted under sponsorship of the National Aeronautics Space Administration.

SIX VIALS

Six vials were launched containing sea urchin eggs in fertilized and unfertilized conditions. The eggs in two vials were fertilized when they were placed in the cone about eight hours before liftoff. The eggs in the other four vials were fertilized by a trigger action during the acceleration.

Dr. Young revealed that the pre-fertilized eggs continued to develop during flight, which included extreme vibration, exposure to radiation, and about nine minutes of weightlessness. Upon recovery they were alive and still developing.

However, the eggs that were fertilized with sperm during the flight disintegrated. This may have been due to the vibration encountered during flight and reentry. Or it may have resulted from an improper mixture in a fixative which was added to the vials during reentry. The fixative was supposed to stop the development of the eggs immediately before reentry, which would have allowed scientists to study tissue

which was created under rocket travel conditions.

TEST PURPOSE

The primary purpose of the experiment was to derive as much information as possible as to the effect of space phenomena on cell division. Scientists had wondered, for instance, if the lack of gravity over an extended period would seriously impair or halt cell development.

The pre-fertilized eggs were not affected — an egg fertilized for several hours has considerably greater resistance to vibration than an unfertilized egg.

Dr. Young said the disintegration of the eggs in the one portion of the experiment can be easily overcome in the future by cushioning the vials and using a different fixative.

FORMATION CONTINUES

"We have gained a great deal of useful information and it is encouraging to know that cell formation can continue under space conditions," he said.

"With a slightly different approach to preparations, we feel that the other part of the experiment will be equally satisfying."

Young studied the specimens at Ft. Brooke, San Juan, P. R., soon after the recovery ship docked. Final preparation at Cape Canaveral and placement of the vials aboard the missile was done by Dr. Charles Metz of the Florida State University, Tallahassee, a consultant to the ABMA, and Don Cochran of the Agency's Research Projects Lab.

The vials and associated equipment for the fertilization experiment were designed by Jerry Johnson, Research Projects Laboratory.

Dr. Young's organization was also responsible for coordination of the other five test tube experiments. Four of them, using human blood, onion tissue and seeds, drosophila and yeast, were sponsored by the Army Medical Research Laboratory, Ft. Knox, Ky. The Brookhaven National Laboratory, Upton, N.Y., sponsored an experiment to determine radiation on corn germination.

The ABMA Structures and Mechanics Laboratory built the equipment necessary for all of the experiments.

FORT STEWART, Ga. (ANS)—SFC Walter E. Spencer Sr. will leave the Army next month after 43 years active and Reserve service—but he doesn't plan retirement. He's an ordained Baptist minister. "I've dedicated myself to church work," he said. "There's no retirement in that kind of work . . . it's continuous."

Saturn Vehicle Capable Of Landing Items On Moon

SAN DIEGO, Calif. — Dr. Ernst Stuhlinger of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency today described the Saturn space vehicle as being capable of landing "1,000 to 2,000 pounds of scientific instruments gently on the surface of the moon."

Dr. Stuhlinger, director of ABMA's Research Projects Laboratory, is one of eight Army Ordnance Missile Command representatives who spoke at a meeting of the American Rocket Society.

The Army research scientist spoke on the Army's participation in the national satellite and space probe program. He reviewed the Army's contributions to date, including the Free World's first satellites of the earth and sun, and gave a preview of future programs.

VARIOUS USES
"Saturn, the 1,500,000 pound thrust booster we are developing, represents a very useful work-

horse for heavy low-altitude satellites, for 24 hour communication satellites, for escape probes, and for lunar vehicles which can land 1,000 to 2,000 pounds of instruments on the moon surface," he said.

"The same booster lends itself ideally to a freight carrier as needed for the establishment of a large permanent satellite station around the earth."

The Saturn, a cluster of eight Jupiter-type liquid engines, is under development by ABMA for the Advanced Research Projects Agency, Department of Defense. The Missile Command, parent organization to ABMA, is responsible for space exploration projects assigned by ARPA and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

VAN ALLEN BELTS
He said the Army Explorer satellites and Pioneer space probes brought about the discovery of the Van Allen radiation belts, and significant improvements of other scientific data of the earth, the high atmosphere and space beyond.

"More scientific satellites, known as the Juno II series, are being prepared for 1959 and 1960 launchings," he commented.

Referring to another phase of space work, Dr. Stuhlinger noted that "the first Army missile with human passengers will be launched as a part of Project Mercury," for the NASA.

Watch Hercules

Twenty-five members of the American Institute of Mining Engineers on a field trip from Carlsbad, N.M., paid WSMR an all-day visit last week.

The group consisted of both military and civilian members, and they were given a comprehensive view of the range operations by the host Acting Commanding Officer Col. Russell R. Klanderman.

Highest points of the tour were their witnessing of Hawk and Nike-Hercules firings.

They received briefings on the Lacrosse missile, Integrated Range Mission, Ordnance Mission, and Honest John rocket.

They also viewed the film "From Flight to Facts" and toured the Redstone area.

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U.S. 70 Stretch Being Watched

(Continued from Page 1) by any one driver, this office will revoke that driver's missile range registration, thereby depriving him of the driving privilege he has abused," Col. Wells said.

The stricter enforcement policy by the lawmen will aim at drivers who crowd the preceding car, presenting a potential hazard in the case of sudden stops. Safety recommendations on following call for a minimum of one car-length between cars for each ten miles an hour of speed.

Illegal and careless passing also is a bugaboo on Highway 70, with cars weaving in and out of traffic with little regard to oncoming traffic or to the normal flow of traffic in the direction the passer is driving.

STRICT LIMITS
Speed limits will be enforced to the letter, with 70 m.p.h. rates in effect during daytime on those portions of the highway not now under construction.

The limit in construction zones is 45 miles an hour and is so marked.

Regarding the passing of slower moving vehicles in the construction area or on the four-lane segment of Organ Pass, the State Police say "pass within the speed limits, but pass in order, the first car behind the slow-moving vehicle being the first to pass and the rest of the line following in order."

LATE-LEAVERS

Also getting the word from the law officials are WSMR commuters who delay their morning departure from Las Cruces in order to avoid the peak traffic, then speed to get to work on time. The word from the cops is "obey speed limits — or else!"

The clamping of a safety lid on the highway is not new, but it has been made necessary stronger in view of the mounting accident rate involving the commuter traffic.

Last fall's surveillance of leapfrog passing on the two-lane stretch of U. S. 70 resulted in greater observation of speed, following and passing regulations and in a lessening of accidents.

Clocking On-Post Speeding

(Continued from Page 1) the normal work day and the protection will help insure the safety of the school-age youngsters, now out of the classrooms, as well as the safety of the 10,000 WSMR employees and military personnel.

The use of the military officers to supplement the Military Police will provide continuation of a speed clampdown that is not new but has been taxed by a spreading thin of the MP force.

Scores of speedometer pushers at WSMR can attest to the fact the crackdown is not new.

But because more motorists seem to be infected by the go-go schedule under which the missile range operates to prove the weapons of America's defense arsenal, Col. Klandermand has called for sterner measures.

Indicative of the stepup in speeders is the number of Military Police-issued citations for speeding in the first week of June — nine! That averages out to nearly 40 a month, and the number has been increasing.

With the direction to officers to report all offenders, more speeders are about to discover that the few seconds they've saved are worth more in cash than they dreamed.

As complainants against speeders, the officers will be made available to testify in court — two-way insurance that, first, speeding accusations will not be indiscriminately tossed about and, second, that a driver spotted topping the legal limits will face a well-documented charge of his violation.

In issuing his directive, Col. Klandermand warned complaining officers to make certain that speed limits are exceeded before filing a complaint with the provost marshal, but he also pointed out that it will not be necessary to stop the offender — "By attempting to stop some of the speeders I've seen around here you might be taking your life into your own hands."

The colonel pointed out that speed limits in all areas of the missile range and on nearby highways are plainly posted.

Regarding speed limits off post, Col. Klandermand reminded drivers of government vehicles that these conveyances are subject to certain speed limits not affected by higher state limits.

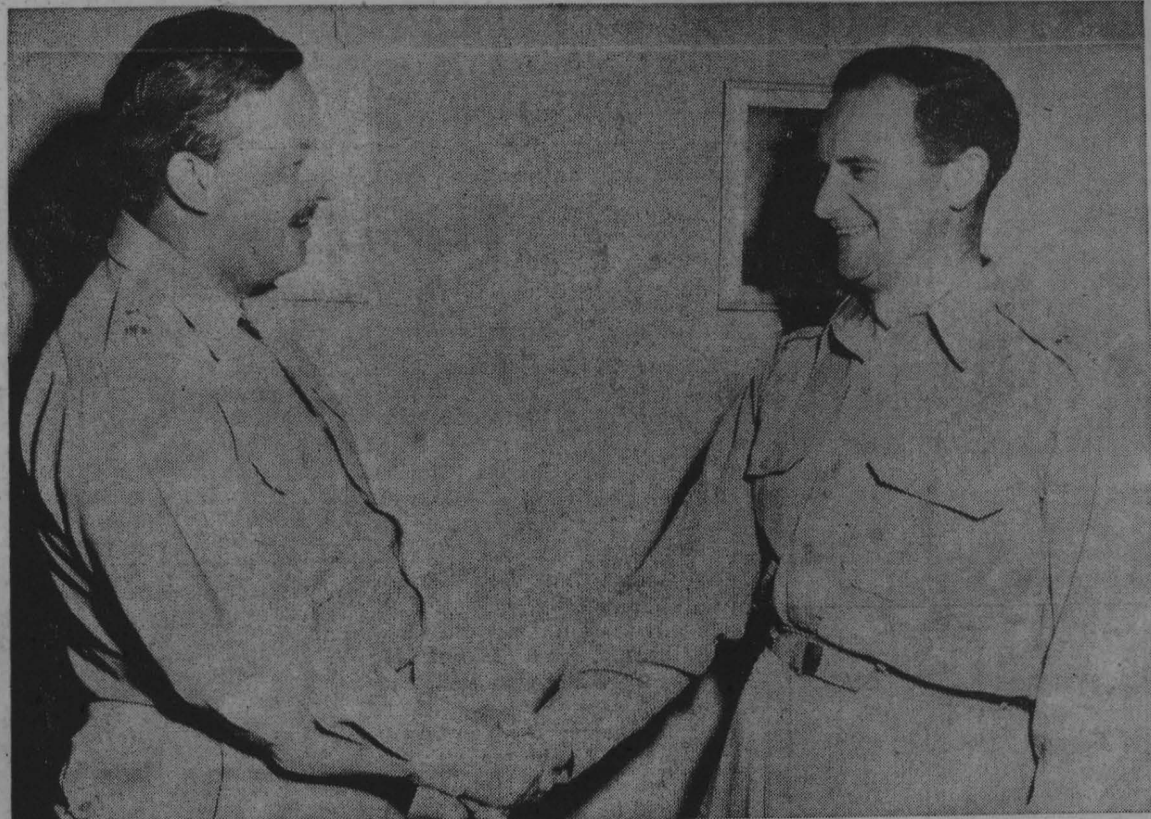
Vehicles with the "55 MPH" marking on the dashboard are limited to that speed despite the fact they may be travelling, for instance, on Highway U. S. 70 on which New Mexico law sets a 70 mile per hour rate.

All state speed limits below the maximum speeds allowed the various government vehicles must be adhered to, of course.

In addition to the on-post drive to halt speeding, steps will be taken to insure compliance with off-post speed regulations on vehicles under government jurisdiction, Col. Klandermand concluded.

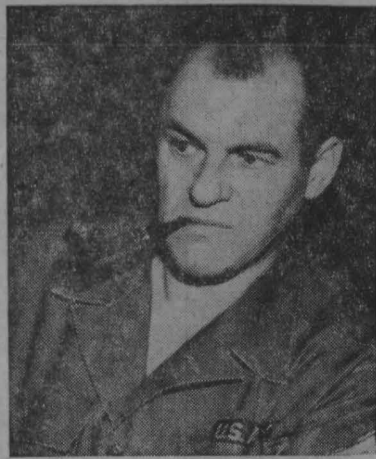
