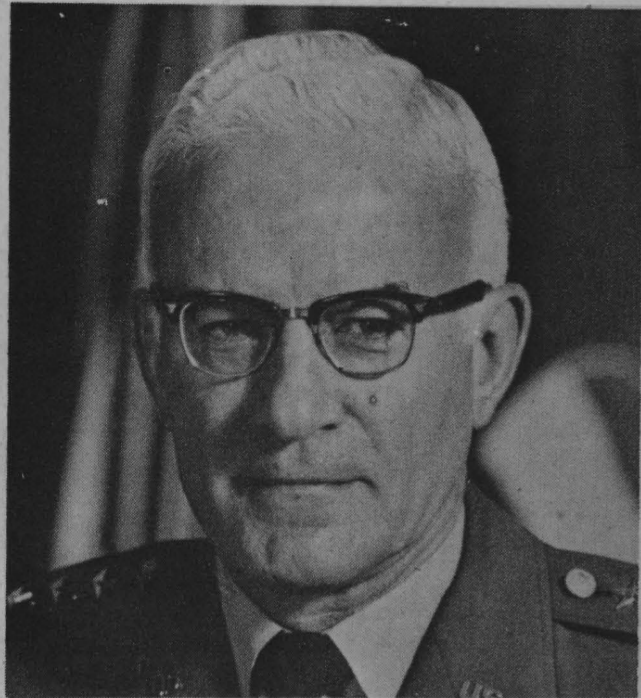


# Top o' the news



**Gen Rogers**

**GENERAL BERNARD W. ROGERS** has been nominated by the President to replace retiring General Fred C. Weyand as Army Chief of Staff, effective October 1. General Rogers is currently the commander of the U.S. Army Forces Command, Fort McPherson, Ga.

**TWO STRANDED HIKERS** were safely brought down from a shale cliff Monday through a joint effort of the San Andreas REACT and the Mesilla Valley C D search and rescue teams. Because of misinformation provided by a third hiker it took the rescuers four and half hours to reach the two. The descent from the "Needles" was made through Filmore Canyon and took about two hours. Once on level ground, young men slipped away before they could be identified.

**THE NEWLY ASSIGNED** deputy commander for technical operations here is no

stranger to the Southwest. He is Colonel Patrick W. Wilson, who was born in El Paso and grew up on a cattle ranch in Ward County, Texas (Pecos-Monahans area). He and his wife, Mary Elaine, have three children and will reside on post.

**SCHOOL STARTS** Aug. 23. Registration will be August 19 for the White Sands School, and August 18, 19 and 20 for Mayfield. Look for details in next week's Ranger.

**ARMYWIDE PROMOTIONS** planned for grades E-5 through O-6 during September are up from the August totals, according to the recently released DA forecast. However, promotions to CWO-3 and 4 are down from last month.

Enlisted promotions include 3,500 to E-5; 2,420 to E-6; 1,492 to E-7; 531 to E-8; and 96 to E-9.

Warrant officer promotions include 42 to CWO-3 and 9 to CWO-4. Other officer hikes

include 417 to O-3; 204 to O-4; 181 to O-5; and 52 to O-6.

**SELECTION BOARDS** have been tentatively scheduled to convene on Sept. 8 to consider officers of the Army, Chaplain and Women's Army Corps for permanent promotion to the grade of Colonel. The Army Medical Department (AMEDD) selection board will convene around Aug. 23. The boards will consider all eligible regular Army O-5s, (all promotion lists) with a permanent date of rank Dec. 31, 1974 or with a basic date of Dec. 31, 1953 or earlier.

**A PROMOTION SELECTION** board will meet on or about October 27 to consider eligible E-7s for promotion to master sergeant. The primary zone announced by MILPERCEN message, includes all E-7s with date of rank (DOR) Sept. 30, 1970 or earlier. The secondary zone includes all personnel on active duty as E-7 whose DOR are Oct. 1, 1970-March 31, 1973.

## Crash leaves one dead, one injured

A White Sands Missile Range soldier was killed and another seriously injured in a one car accident about 10 p.m. last Friday.

Private First Class Joseph E. Lester, Jr., of Newark, N.J., died at William Beaumont Army Medical Center in El Paso at 8:02 a.m. Sunday (August 1).

Specialist Four Tyrone T. Marshall is now in stable condition at Beaumont with a broken leg.

Both soldiers were assigned to B Company at Holloman Air Force Base.

The accident occurred approximately four miles south of Corona, N.M., where the automobile Lester was driving left highway 54 and rolled over.

Lester and Marshall were transported by ambulance to Holloman AFB hospital and from there airlifted to Beaumont. They were admitted to Beaumont at 4:30 a.m. Saturday.

Staff Sergeant Clyde McCoy, who was in another car ahead of Lester and Marshall when the accident occurred, said the car apparently hit the soft shoulder of the road which caused the driver to lose control.

Lester was a crew chief with the Army Air Operations Directorate at Holloman. The accident was investigated by New Mexico authorities.

## Artistic? Try this one!

A contest to select a theme and design for White Sands Missile Range's 1977 Sun Carnival parade float was announced Monday by the Public Affairs office.

The contest, to be conducted through the WSMR Incentive Awards Program, is open to all active duty Army and DAC personnel at WSMR August 27. The winner of the contest, to be announced September 15, will receive special recognition and a monetary award of \$50.

### REPRESENTS WSMR

The planned float or exhibit will be used to represent the Range in the annual, regionally televised Sun Carnival Parade in El Paso on New Years Day, 1977, and other area parades during the coming year.

The selection committee primarily will be looking for an idea that will be representative of the U.S. Army and, at the same time,

conform with the overall parade theme of "Music Magic."

Simplicity of design and construction and minimum construction costs also will weigh heavily in selection of the winning entry.

### HOW TO ENTER

Ideas and designs submitted need not be described professionally or drawn to scale, or be in color. A rough drawing accompanied by a narrative description will suffice. The entry must be submitted as an attachment to a signed suggestion form (DA form 1045).

Post personnel desiring to submit entries can mail or deliver them to the Incentive Awards office, Bldg. 124, between now and August 27. Entries received after that date will be ineligible for the prize.

### ABOUT SELECTION

A committee consisting of J. R. Lovelady, Public Affairs office, Donald Graves, Audio-

Visual Center, Donald Harris, Welfare and Recreation, and Bernie Cook, Facilities Engineering, will select the winning entry for recognition through the Incentive Awards Program subject to the final approval of the range commander. The committee, however, will not be bound to select a winner.

To assist prospective suggesters, the skeleton of WSMR's two-unit float can be seen at TMP No. 2. Photographs of past exhibits also are available for review at the Public Affairs office, Room 109, Bldg. 100.

The design or idea submitted should be limited to a one or two-unit float. In case a two-unit design is submitted, the prime mover, a stripped down pickup, will tow the second unit. In the case of a one-unit exhibit, the prime mover can either push the bulk of its float. In both cases a unit cannot exceed 30 feet in length, 13 feet in width or 14 feet in height from ground up.

## Three sentenced in gemsbock kill

Three local soldiers have been fined a total of \$2,000 and face the next 90 days in jail for killing an African gemsbock on White Sands Missile Range.

Privates Kevin M. Wells, Steve C. Little and Alford G. Marchand, all of the 259th MP Company, were arrested following an investigation by New Mexico Department of Game and Fish and WSMR military police.

The soldiers were assessed the largest fines ever imposed in New Mexico for illegal killing of a game animal. In addition the fines and jail sentences, the three must also pay some \$310 each in court costs. Alamogordo

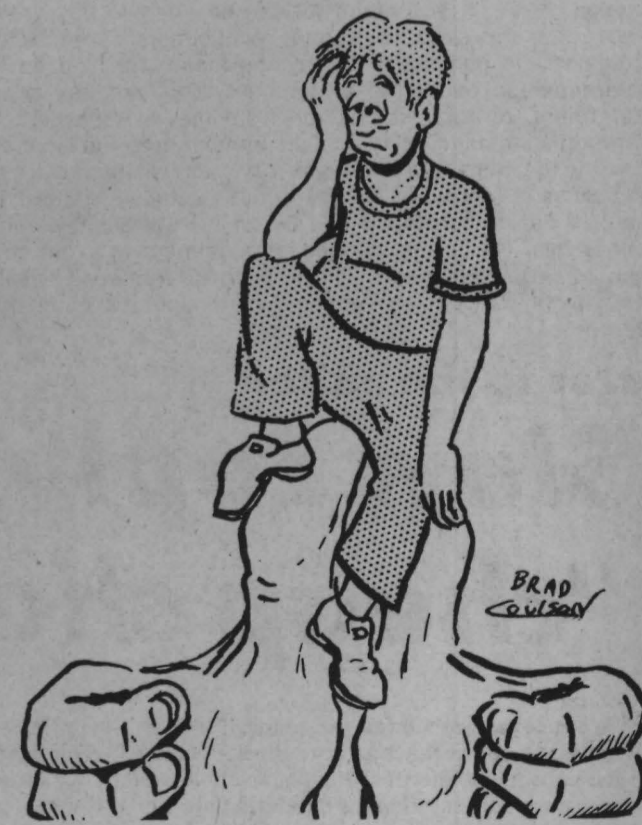
Magistrate Robert Bradley handed down the sentences.

The gemsbock (or oryx) is an African antelope weighing from 400 to 500 pounds. A small herd was released on WSMR in 1969 as a cooperative project between the Army and the Bureau of Land Management. The herd has grown to about 150 animals today.

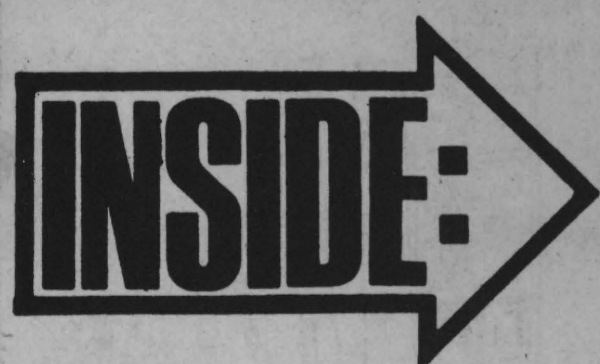
According to Game and Fish officials, the value of the slain beast to a zoo or game ranch would be about \$4,000.

Game and Fish officials annually award about six permits for only two public hunts.

## Ed center contemplates masters degree program

Interested in pursuing a masters degree on post? Pepperdine University of California and the Education Center are exploring the possibility of forming a masters degree in human resources management here. The (MAHRM) degree combines coursework in management and behavioral science with an emphasis on decision making, organization

development, management systems, interpersonal and intergroup behavior, research methodology, and organizational change.

A Pepperdine representative will give a presentation on the degree program at the Education Center, building 464 at 12:30 p.m. August 17. Whether the course is offered here will depend on the number of persons who show an interest in pursuing the program.

The 36 semester degree program can be completed in 10-15 months. Classes will be held Thursday, 6-10 p.m., Friday 4-10 p.m., Saturday 9-5 p.m., and Sunday 9-1 p.m. Students will take only one course at a time and may complete courses at the rate of one a month. Tuition is \$72 per semester hour.

## White House Fellows learn top leadership

Outstanding soldiers in all grades are encouraged to apply for the 1977-78 White House Fellows Program.

Fifteen to twenty fellows, military and civilian, are selected each year to serve for a one-year period (September 1 to August 31) at the highest levels of Federal government. Of this group, the Army has had one or two selectees each year.

To be eligible, men and women must be U.S. citizens and at least 23 but not more than 35 years old on September 1, 1977. They must have demonstrated unusual ability, high moral character, outstanding motivation, and a broad capacity for leadership. In addition, persons applying must show exceptional promise for future development and be dedicated to the

institutions of the U.S. Those interested should refer to AR 621-7 for application procedures. Applications should then be sent through Channels to the soldier's appropriate career division to arrive not later than September 2. Since 1965, the program has provided gifted and highly motivated young Americans with first-hand experience in the process of governing the nation and a sense of personal involvement in the leadership of the country. ## Centralized commissaries may cut prices

(ARNEWS) - The Army commissary shopper's dollar may eventually buy more groceries, according to DA officials. On July 1, 44 more Army commissaries came under the centralized management program developed by the Fort Lee-based U.S. Army Troop Support Agency.

DA sources say the centralized program may enable the Army to place single large-volume wholesale orders, which may produce some savings, due to a reduction in administrative processing costs. The savings may be passed on to commissary shoppers in the form of lower unit prices.

The consolidation move brought nearly half of the Army's worldwide commissary store system under the centralized program. The first 19 stores from the nine-state Southeast

Region, initiated the program in February 1976.

Twenty-four of the 44 stores will be operated by the 14-state Northeast Region Commissary Field Office at Ft. Meade, Md., while 20 stores will be managed by the Midwest Region Commissary Field Office at Ft. Sam Houston, Tex. This region covers an 18-state area, including White Sands Missile Range.

Combined sales for these two regions amount to more than \$1.8 million daily.

On October 1, the system will be joined by the Western and European Field Offices. The Western office, to be located at Ft. Lewis, Wash., will manage the stores in the remaining nine-state area, and will also include the stores in Alaska, Hawaii, Japan, and Korea. The European Field Office will be located at Zweibruecken, Germany, and will control 62 stores in seven European countries.

For our scrapbook of C.B. history here's some info on the late Class B service.

Started in 1947, with class A, class B citizens radio was of interest to many. The radios for class B were operated AM or FM. The frequencies were about 465 MHz. With some exceptions the rigs were

crystal controlled with five watts input to the finals and four out. Unfortunately, equipment costs and limited range prevented this class from becoming very widely used, and class B was terminated Nov. 1, 1971.

Ever wonder what skip is all about and where it started? Skip signals are reflected by ionized gases known as Kennelly-Heaviside layers.

These layers are named after scientists who working separately, both suggested the earth was surrounded by an electrified layer acting as a reflector.

After it was demonstrated not one but several such layers exist, the name ionosphere was suggested for the region where the layers were found.

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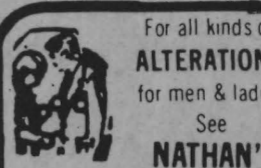
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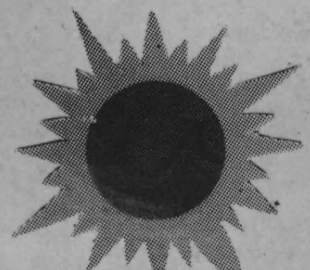
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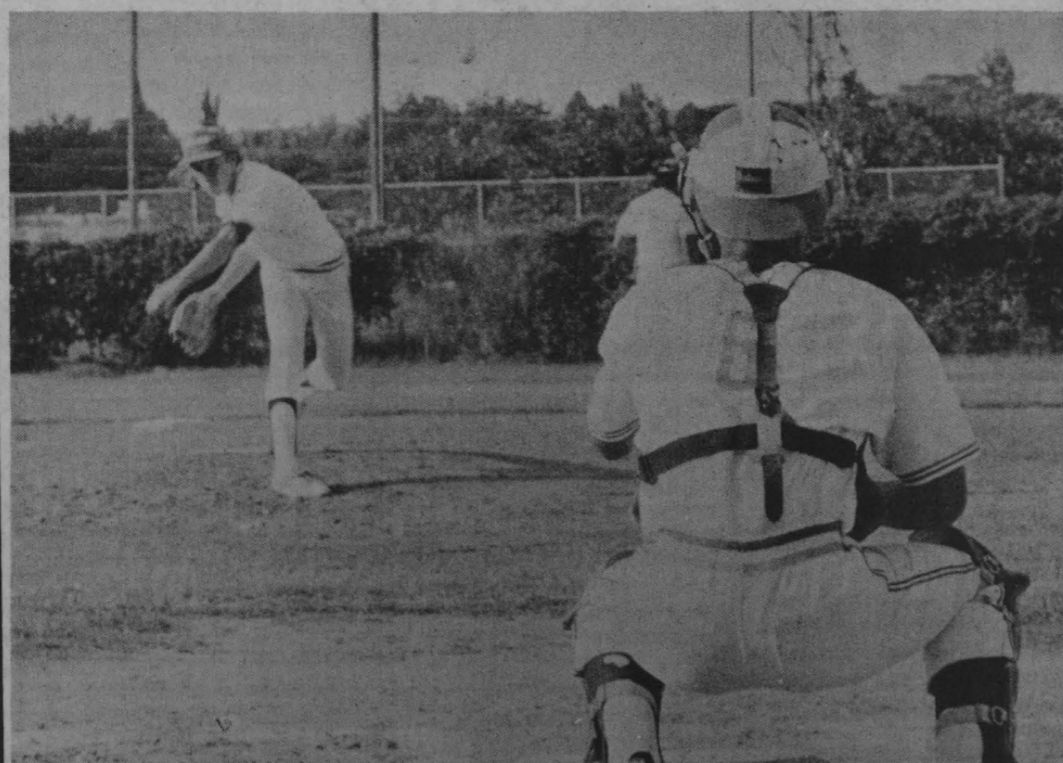
# Rangers host regionals tonight

## Army athletes prove selves in Montreal

(ARNEWS) — Active Army and Reserve Component athletes continue to prove themselves as world class competitors during the XXI Olympic games in Montreal.

The latest soldier athlete to win a medal was "mini mite" strongman SP4 Lee James of Ft. Campbell, Ky. James, last year's middle heavyweight national champion weightlifter, snatched a silver medal in his Olympic competition weightclass.

Reserve Sgt. Don Haldeman was the first of the 16 soldier athletes to strike gold. The sergeant, a 7th place finisher in the 1972 Olympics, took first in the clay pigeon trap shooting competition.

Capt. Lanny Bassham, Ft. Benning, Ga., a silver medalist in the last summer games in Munich, shot for gold in the small bore competition in Montreal. Reserve Capt. Margaret Murdock, who actually tied Bassham in total points but lost out to a last target bullseye count tie breaker, took the silver medal. This makes "Maggie" the first woman in history to win an Olympic shooting medal.

Sp4 Charvin Dixon, assigned to the U.S. Army Marksmanship Unit, Ft. Benning, Ga., tied for the eleventh slot in the trap shooting events. Dixon was the winner of last year's U.S. clay pigeon championships.

Two Ft. Sam Houston, Tex., soldier athletes were members of the U.S. Olympic modern pentathlon team which finished fifth in the final team standings. Sgt. John Fitzgerald, the 1974 U.S. modern pentathlon champ placed sixth in individual competition. His teammate, Pfc Mike Burley, finished in 16th place. Burley was tenth in the 1975 modern pentathlon world championships.

Sgt. Charles Mooney, the hard-hitting bantamweight boxer from Ft. Bragg, N.C., lost his bid for gold Saturday night but came away with the silver. Five of Mooney's teammates made good on their quest for gold medals.

Procurement officials here report purchases of equipment, supplies and services in the local trade area for the fourth

quarter of fiscal year 1976 (April, May and June) totaled \$2,310,342.

Harlan L. Sluyter, director of Procurement, said \$1,242,518 was disbursed in El Paso and \$527,055 went to the Las Cruces trade area. Nearly \$406,000 was spent in Albuquerque and \$132,799 went to Alamogordo.

The bulk of the El Paso expenditure (\$392,160) was paid to El Paso Electric Company. Other El Paso purchases included \$39,490 to Cole Drilling Company and \$33,326 to Sperry-Rand Inc.

Major expenditures in Las Cruces were \$47,362 to Hewlett-Packard and \$52,598 to Adam II Limited for grounds maintenance. Southern Union Gas and Aerdyne Inc. of Alamogordo received \$76,379 and \$24,241 respectively.

Expenditures in Albuquerque included Bell and Howell (\$83,967) and Dynalutron Corp. (\$50,606). In addition to expenditures noted above, the range paid out more than \$25 million during the fourth quarter in military and civilian salaries and wages.

## Requests due for periodical

(ARNEWS) — If October issues of "Soldiers Magazine" or other DA periodicals for your unit's reading room don't arrive, it may be that someone forgot to send in the new DA Form 12-5 (Requirements for Periodicals of the Army Periodicals, Feb. 76). That's the word from Army AG

Publication Center officials in their July 19 letter to all field publications account holders. The new form 12-5 must be submitted no later than Sept. 1 or all subscriptions for periodicals contained on the Oct. 73 version of the DA Form 12-5 will be cancelled. AG Pub Center officials say that they must assume that account holders not submitting the new form by Sept. 1 have no further need for the periodicals they have been receiving in the past.

TOE units changing to the Consolidation Above Company Level (CABL) concept should check with Battalion level publication account holders. The new form lists all Army periodicals and the criteria for establishing requirements for each is printed on the reverse side. Army officials suggest that commanders should personally review their accounts under their jurisdiction and insure that the new requirements conform to the criteria for each periodical.

face, he feels his men will "have a fighting chance if they're up to the tourney, though in the final days, pitching could be a factor."

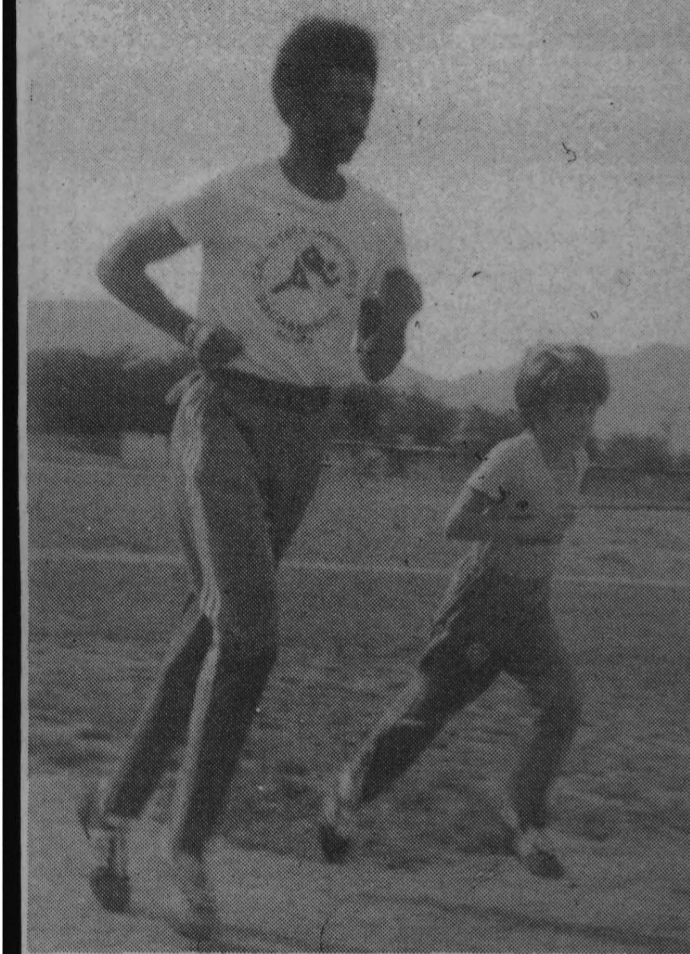

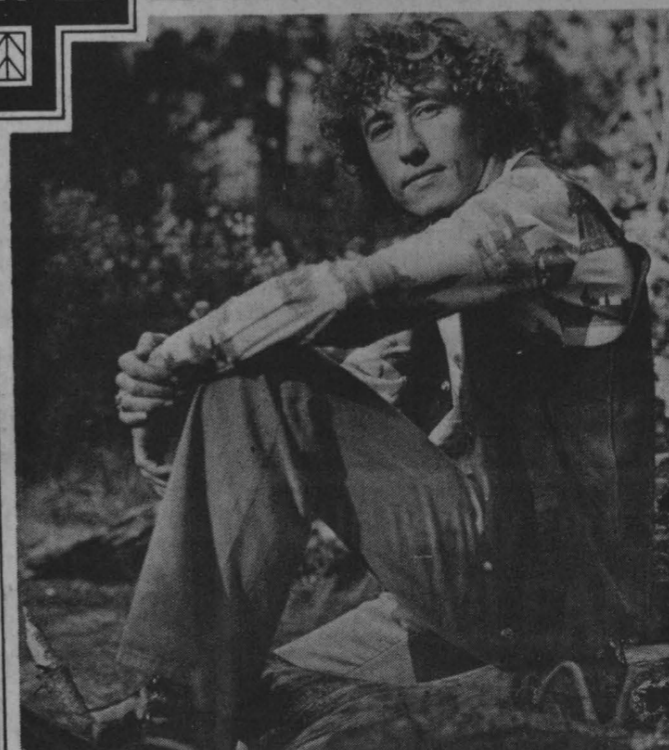

## Policy revised on medical extensions

(ARNEWS) - A revision is in line for Army personnel policies concerning extension of a service member on active duty for medical care or for dependent medical care. Major aspects of this revision, recently approved by the Secretary of the Army are as follows:

Army personnel (officer and enlisted) with an established release date would only be continued on active duty for medical care when hospitalized or when undergoing physical disability processing, or both. A request must be submitted to designated approval authorities (HQDA for officers, GCM authority for enlisted) for review and approval of the extension. Additionally, enlisted members must consent to being retained on active duty.

Officers will not be extended on active duty past their established release date solely on the basis of dependent medical problems. Short term 90-day extensions may be granted by MILPERCEN for extreme hardship in those cases where Federal law does not impose a mandatory release date.

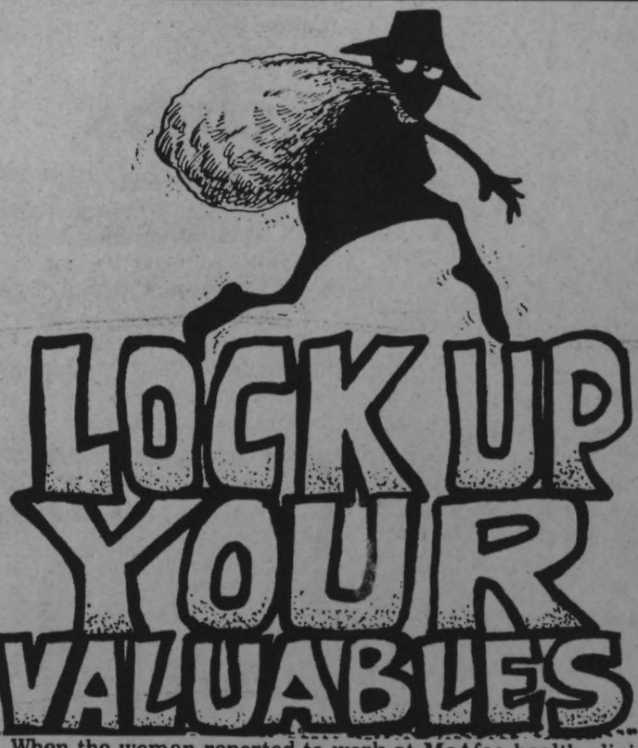
Requests for continued medical care for the dependent of an officer will be considered on a case-by-case basis as a designee of the Secretary of the Army. Requests should be forwarded to the Office of the Surgeon General.

Enlisted personnel who require a waiver-exception to policy to be continued on active duty may request an extension on the basis of dependent medical problems for up to 12 months.

Army officials found several major inequalities in the policy currently in effect: Extensions past established release dates of Army personnel (officers and enlisted) requiring medical care lacked proper guidance, control and approval.

Only certain categories of officers and enlisted personnel could be extended on active duty for dependent medical problems.

Reserve and Regular Army officers designated for involuntary release because of non-selection for permanent promotion had release dates established by law and could not be extended on active duty for dependent medical problems.



When the woman reported to work at McAfee health clinic, she put her purse in her desk. In the morning it contained \$75. This past Monday, the crime prevention office ran a quick check in the main post area for unsecured cars. In just 23 minutes they found 387 cars unlocked. And 81 of those were equipped with CB radios - a prime target for the petty thief. The crime prevention office reminds all WSMRites that, if you don't lock it up, it's just a matter of time before the thief steals from you.
