Everybody collects something

THE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF COLLECTIBLES

(Volume I)

(Time Life Books • 160 pages • \$7.95)

I suspect Tme Life Books may have another best selling series on its hands as the word gets around on "The Encyclopedia of Collectibles." (I consider their "The Old West" series to be one of the finest references available. I suspect it has proven to be Time Life's best selling series to date and probably their biggest promotion too). I offer this prediction on "The Encyclopedia of Collectibles" for several reasons.

First, just about everyone I know has at least one hobby that involves collecting things: coins, stamps, beer cans, matchbook covers, nails, firearms, you name it. These collectors seem to sooner or later acquire a secondary hobby as a result of the first. This even happens to dealers who may operate a successful coin store, as an example, who then for no logical reason add Jim Beam or Avon bottles, pocket watches and mantel clocks, or edged weapons to their inventory.

"The Encyclopedia of Collectibles" is not an exhaustive study of each field of collectibles. Quantities, varieties and representative market values are not furnished. But the text has been prepared with the expertise of literally hundreds of America's most noted collectors and provides vital background information and suggestions.

Secondly, all of us have saved various items over the years — a shaving mug, and/or a mustache cup and/or a straight edge razor which may have belonged to our grandfather; a pendant watch or a brooch which were grandmother's; old family Bibles, a piece of furniture, a loving spoon. Maybe the item was found or given to us. Perhaps we bought it because it appeared to be old and valuable. But how do we authenticate and date it? Where do we go to determine worth? How do we begin to build a collection of similar items? How does one detect forgerics?

Thirdly, the series is enjoyable reading amply illustrated with photographs, charts and close-up details. For instance, Volume I covers advertising giveaways, such as American eagles, animation film art, arrowheads, art glass, art pottery, autographs, automoblia, toy banks, barbed wire, baseball cards and baskets. I don't collect any of these nor do I have any intention of doing so. Yet I was fascinated by this tome and can hardly wait to receive Volume II.

Incidentally, a bonus supplement to this series is a little booklet entitled "The Collectors Handbook: A Guide to the Marketplace" which briefly covers bidding at auctions, holding your own garage sale, protecting against fire and theft, flea markets, dealers and shows, and appraisals among other topics.

Bishop Flores urges Americans to keep 'tapestry' fibers unique

Today brings to a close the week's events which have included cultural presentations, classes and ethnic films celebrating Hispanic Heritage week here at the range.

The kick-off began Monday morning with mass cele-

brated at the Main Post Chapel by Bishop Patrick F. Flores of the El Paso Diocese. At the luncheon held immediately afterwards the bishop was the guest speaker.

In his address he spoke on the prophecies of liberty and equality for all set down by the framers of the constitution, and the hidden impact they have had on this country.

"What they did not foresee and accomplish, it is for you and for me, and for the people of the future generations, to make a reality for all men and all women ...," said

On the subject of heritage the bishop said, "Who really am I? What am I? ... I'm the result, the product of a great mixture. A mixture of Hispanic and Indian blood... it wasn't a matter of one defeating the other, it was a painful birth of a new nation ... the Mexican-American."

This mixture and other kinds, Bishop Flores refers to

"A tapestry, wherein each fiber retains its identity ... and retains that which is proper to it. But at the same time lends itself and borrows from," the bishop said.

He went on in his analogy to say this tapestry with one color would be tasteless. But one with many colors would lend itself to beauty and shape like the human race.

"This is what we find ... the American people a tapestry composed of nationalities, linguistics and cultural backgrounds. Out of this mixture of people in the United States we have the beauty, the power and the greatness that is

The bishop spoke of this particular week as being one fiber which pertains to the Hispanics — those of Spanish descent. He explained the 'why and what for' of this week by pointing out the number of Hispanics which is increasing all the time. With this influx comes the needs of the Hispanics, which have to be dealt with for them to become contributing members in this country.

The bishop warned if these needs were not met there could be the chance of a rebellion.

'I hope and pray we will not become rebellious. However, I pray and hope we will speak up ... and speak up if we are not getting our fair share," said Bishop Flores.

He has told his counterparts and friends, "If you want

the Hispanics to grow strong, to remain solidly adherent to you, then you have to allow and foster leadership. And you must give that leadership freedom to be.

"We, the Hispanic minority, are people with problems and needs. We don't want to become rebellious. We want to grow, we want to participate. We want to share in the responsibility of keeping America strong.

He asked for changes in the areas of education and housing which have become problems plaguing not only the Hispanics but others in this country.

With the observation of Hispanic Heritage Week across the country the bishop remarked, "This is great, but to me this is only a ceremonial event. We need to go beyond that ... we want to be taken into account every day of the year. And in every phase of life's society.'

In closing, Bishop Flores left these thoughts by saying, 'This country is yours. This country is mine ... it is your obligation and it is my obligation to keep it growing, to work with the rest of the American family to keep it strong and keep it prospering ... not just for a few select of us but for every American citizen.'







Security Office

People is what their mission is

The Security Office is perhaps the most misunderstood organization at the range. Encompassing a wide range of duties and a good share of both military and civilian personnel, SO has the unusual problem of serving 4,000 square miles effectively.

When trying to define the word security to fit the mission done by SO, the definitions are limitless. The word entails everything from buying time to providing

Security has many hats

When the mission is broken down, SO is divided into several divisions, each of which performs or provides a different aspect of security.

The Intelligence division (SO-I) is the area best known to many. Under SO-I there are two branches. The Information Security branch handles clearances and foreign national contacts to mention a few. In the Industrial Security branch, the areas covered include the security for WSMR's congractor agencies, visitor control, badging, vehicle and firearms registration.

In the Law Enforcement division one finds the MP section of SO. Through this division such areas as traffic control, enforcement, police and military investigation

The area of physical security, under the direction of the Physical Security Division, entails protection of government property from damage, theft and espionage. With a DoD guard force, property is controlled and protected through various techniques involving motorized patrols, fixed posts and intrusion alarm systems. This doesn't include those range riders who go into those hard-to-get-into areas assisting with patrolling and evacuation of the WSMR work force and the neighboring ranchers.

Personnel make SO function

Basically, this is SO in a nut shell. But there is more to the job of security than meets the eye. There is a hidden force behind SO - its people.

SO claims to be like any other organization on post. It is in competition for funds, trying to convince those in charge of the range's mission to buy their service.

But this service is not just an eight-hour deal. Rather it

is a service performed 24 hours a day year round.

It's a never-ending job'

It is not an easy task to accomplish. Just the control visitors and employees on the range is unbelievable Keeping files, badging, determining who should see wh and where has developed into a complex machine the boggles the mind. This, in addition to new regulation in the area of security, have the men and women in the offices constantly on the move.

If this is not enough, SO has the entire range to wor about controlling. They have often remarked how ea it would be to throw a fence around WSMR. However, the is highly impractical due to the range's size. Thus, SO h to improvise with other means.

How to patrol 4,000 square miles

The southern portion of the range, up to Highway is for the most part the responsibility of DoD guard However, both DoD guards and MPs support one anoth in the area of security in this portion of the range. I mid-section of the range is patrolled by MPs stationed. Holloman Air Force Base. They serve both security gua functions as well as perform enforcement function The north sector is patrolled by a contract guard for also functioning in a dual role.

These individuals secure and check property missions to insure safety. They're kept on the move and the job, even when the rest of us call it quits for the day

Enforcement is part of security



But all this is only the tip of the iceberg when it co down to SO's true value. To include every aspect of

and its branches would require volumes.

Even while expanding and taking on new responsibilities, SO can count on its people to do their jumples. Whether it's the receptionist at the Badging Office, MP at the school grounds ensuring the children's sale. or the guard making a check of a lock, the people of are doing the job.

Evilsizor found in Virginia

A White Sands soldier, who was arrested in Virginia last Sunday on misdemeanor charges, will be returned here this week to face charges of desertion and murder.

Private First Class Donald C. Evilsizor, 19, is charged with the murder of his wife, Sp4 Shirley D. Evilsizor, 28, who was also assigned to the range.

Evilsizor, who had been missing from White Sands since April 24 of this year, was arrested by Virginia authorities Sunday night for disorderly conduct and possession of marijuana. A routine police check revealed he was wanted by military authorities at White Sands on the desertion and murder charges.

After answering the Virginia charges in the Norfolk, Va., General District Court on Monday, Evilsizor was handed over to military authorities at Ft. Story, Va. Missile range officials are scheduled to return with him before the weekend.


Mrs. Evilsizor was found unconscious in her quarters

on Sept. 30, 1977, and died at McAfee Army Health Clinic early in October. An autopsy was ordered at the time of her death. The report came back in March 1978. Shortly after, Evilsizor became a suspect in the case, and disappeared from the range.

Both Evilsizor and his wife were assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Troop Command, at the missile range, He was a cook in the post Non-commissioned Officers' Club, and she was a cook in the Consolidated Dining Facility.

Evilsizor's home is listed as Ft. Knox, Ky., and his wife was from Aberdeen, Md.

Also arrested along with Evilsizor last Sunday was PFC Michael Wolf, 21, who is also charged with desertion from White Sands. Wolf and Evilsizor had been living in a campground near Virginia Beach, where Evilsizor was working as a cook. Wolf will be taken to Ft. Bragg, N.C., where charges pending against him will be adjudicated.





Curry and his wife Charlene have four children.






