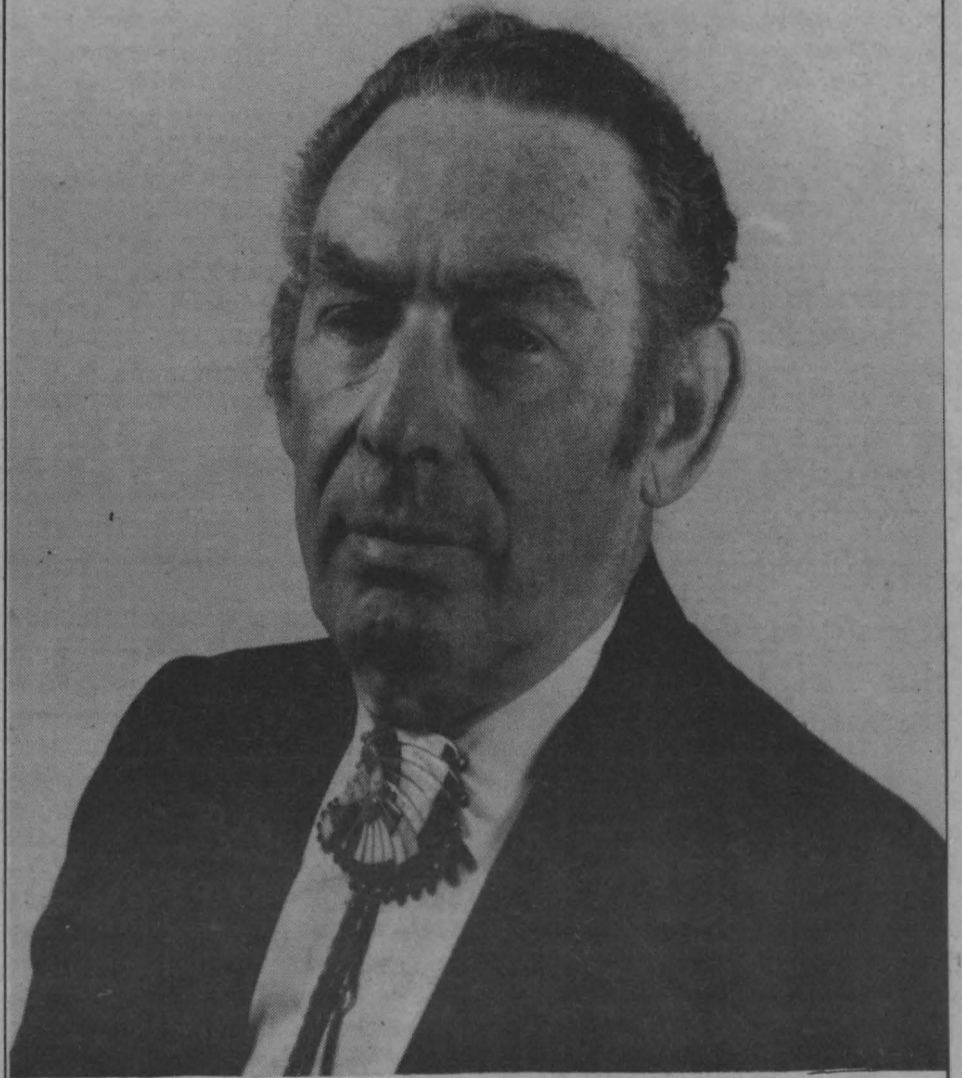

Steinhoff, Wagner to Hall of Fame

Dr. Ernst Steinhoff of Alamogordo and Nathan Wagner of Las Cruces will be inducted into the White Sands Missile Range Hall of Fame on Wednesday. The two men are the 10th and 11th individuals to be elected to the hall of fame since it was started in 1980. The public is invited to the induction ceremonies which take place during a luncheon at the range's Officers Club at 11:30 a.m.

In addition range employees are invited to the monthly awards parade at 9 a.m. and the 10 a.m. unveiling of a Hermes missile which has been loaned by the Smithsonian. Steinhoff and Wagner will be guests of Maj. Gen. Niles Fulwyler, range commander, at the parade ceremonies on JFK Field. They will be with the general when White Sands troops pass in review during the parade. Immediately following the parade buses will be on hand at JFK to take people to and from the Hermes dedication.

The dedication of the Hermes A1 missile will take place at Launch Complex

33 at the old V-2 gantry. The Hermes was a test vehicle used in the late 1940's to run guidance and control experiments. The 25-foot missile was fueled with liquid oxygen and alcohol and was capable of reaching speeds of 1,800 mph. The Smithsonian is loaning the missile to WSMR for display in the V-2 gantry which is part of a New Mexico Historical Monument.

The dedication will include the unveiling of a Peter Hurd painting of a Hermes firing at White Sands. The painting is on permanent loan from the General Electric Co. which commissioned the painting.

Reservations for the 11:30 a.m. induction luncheon are required and can be made by calling Mary Helen Costigan, 678-5707, or Evie Jones, 678-6136, before the close of business Monday. Both numbers are a local call from Las Cruces, Alamogordo and El Paso. The cost of the luncheon will be \$5.50 per person. The menu is BBQ brisket, potato salad, cole slaw, rolls with butter and coffee or iced tea.

Nat Wagner came to what was then White Sand Proving Ground in 1947

as an engineer with the Physical Sciences Lab. He joined the proving ground workforce in 1950.

In 1957 he was made the Missile Flight Safety Officer for the range. He was tasked with building a flight safety organization and developing the technology to control flights and make missile tests safe. As a result he formulated the first procedures for missile flight safety, many of which are still in use here and at other Department of Defense installations and testing facilities throughout the world.

Robert Thompson, director of Range Support at Eglin Air Force Base, Fla. says that Wagner's "innovative ideas helped propel WSMR from an Army gun and rocket testing range to a nationally prominent missile range whose philosophies have been used by the Air Force, Navy and NASA." Because of his work Wagner is still known throughout the testing community as the "Father of Missile Flight Safety."

While working on missile flight safety Wagner implemented the use of large computers to solve flight safety problems. He also proposed the idea of

flight corridors over low population areas to fire missiles from off range onto White Sands. This led to missiles launches from such places as Fort Wingate, N.M., Green River, Utah and a new launch point at Mountain Home, Idaho.

In 1965 Wagner was given a special assignment to develop an engineering organization to update range instrumentation and plan for future needs. Initially known as National Range Engineering the organization Wagner became technical director of is now called the Instrumentation Directorate. It is nationally known for its work in designing and developing new instrumentation for use in military testing.

Wagner retired from federal service in 1973.

Ernst Steinhoff, already a 1979 inductee into the International Space Hall of Fame, came to the United States after World War II with Wernher von Braun and the famous Paperclip Crew. While in Germany he was a key scientist at Peenemunde where the V-1 and V-2 were developed. He also participated

Book review

Former post employee in 'Evidence of Love'

EVIDENCE OF LOVE

A True Story of Passion and Death in the Suburbs

by John Bloom and Jim Atkinson
Texas Monthly Press, 357 pages,

This is one of those documentaries that provides an intimate look of the people and events involved in a bizarre murder in a small town near Dallas. It was compiled from interviews, letters, diaries, court records, and other documentation and, surprisingly enough, with the cooperation of the two central families to the story and two of the main characters in the tragedy.

Readers would be justified in assuming it would be boring fare of an academic and aloof recounting from the Introduction I just provided. But they would be wrong.

I was fascinated by the time I had completed the first couple of chapters. And my captivation continued to the very end. It is one of those books you hate to put down - that you stay up far beyond

your normal bedtime to continue.

I have tried to analyze in retrospect what it was about "Evidence of Love" that caused this unexpected reaction. Was it the authors' style? The detail of personal lives not normally available to outsiders? The fact that Pat was an El Paso boy (Ysleta High, Texas Western) who met his wife, Candy, on a visit to his hometown? Or that Candy, an Army Brat, was so candid in discussing her past? Was it because Betty, the popular girl from Norwich, Kan. and Allan, the teaching assistant from Larned, Kan., that she fell in love with and married at Southwestern College in Winfield once lived in Las Cruces, where she attended New Mexico State and he worked for the Safeguard Missile System at WSMR? Was it because the suburb, the church, the daily routines, the individuals encompassed in the tale - other than the terrible act of violence - were so common, so familiar, so universal that it was easy to identify with and become engrossed in?

I frankly don't know. Recommended.

Military policeman is top soldier for August

The WSMR Soldier of the Month for August is a 19-year-old native of Las Vegas, Nev.

Pvt. Lance Ingram of the 259th Military Police Company won the title after competing against soldiers from other military companies on post. Each soldier was judged on knowledge of military subjects, bearing and appearance.

The military policeman is the son of John and Shelly Ingram of Las Vegas. He graduated from high school in Las Vegas in 1982.

Ingram enlisted 10 months ago. "I joined the Army for its educational benefits," he said.

Currently, Ingram is working toward a college degree by taking psychology and history classes from New Mexico State University. He got a head start on his degree through the College Level Examination Program. "I got my first year out of the way by taking the CLEP test," he said.

Ingram came to White Sands in March after completing basic training at Fort McClellan, Ala. As a WSMR military policeman, his duties include patrolling the post area.

In his spare time, Ingram enjoys drawing, juggling and playing football. He

said he plans to join the WSMR intramural football program this fall.

As Soldier of the Month, Ingram will receive a three-day pass, a \$25 cash award and a letter of commendation from Range Commander Maj. Gen. Niles Fullwyler. He also will receive the free use of a car, a weekend's lodging and free meals from various Las Cruces businesses. In addition, he will be honored by the El Paso Chamber of Commerce.

Initial drug test results being sent to soldiers

The Army has begun sending results of urine drug test reviews to soldiers whose initial tests were positive between April 27, 1982 and Nov. 1, 1983.

The Army is reviewing almost 100,000 positive results reported during that period.

Notification packets contain a letter, which states whether the results are legally supportable or not; a list of Trial Defense Service Office telephone numbers worldwide; and a copy of the form necessary to petition the Army board for the Correction of Military Records for Relief. The Board will consider each case individually, and may grant relief to correct an error or right an injustice.

By notifying everyone, whether the results are supportable or not, Army officials say they intend to make sure everyone concerned is treated fairly.

The bottom line, according to Maj. Donald Kerr of the Army's Alcohol and Drug Policy Office, remains accuracy and supportability. Problems that have surfaced involve some tests conducted before November 1983. But, "We're convinced the results of tests performed since November are supportable," Kerr said.

April spot checks of all Army labs revealed more than 98 percent of the scientific test records and 99 percent of the chains of custody were supportable.

The actual work of notification is being done by the Urinalysis Records Review Team, a 19-member task force located at Fort Meade, Md., drawn from various commands in the Washington area, this

team is responsible for making the link between data and names and mailing the letters. They expect to complete the process prior to December 31.

"The cross-matching of Social Security numbers and names is a tremendous undertaking," Kerr explained. He added that several government agencies have offered to assist in locating persons who have left the Army.

Kerr said, however, that the effort required to repair problems from the past should not obscure future initiatives.

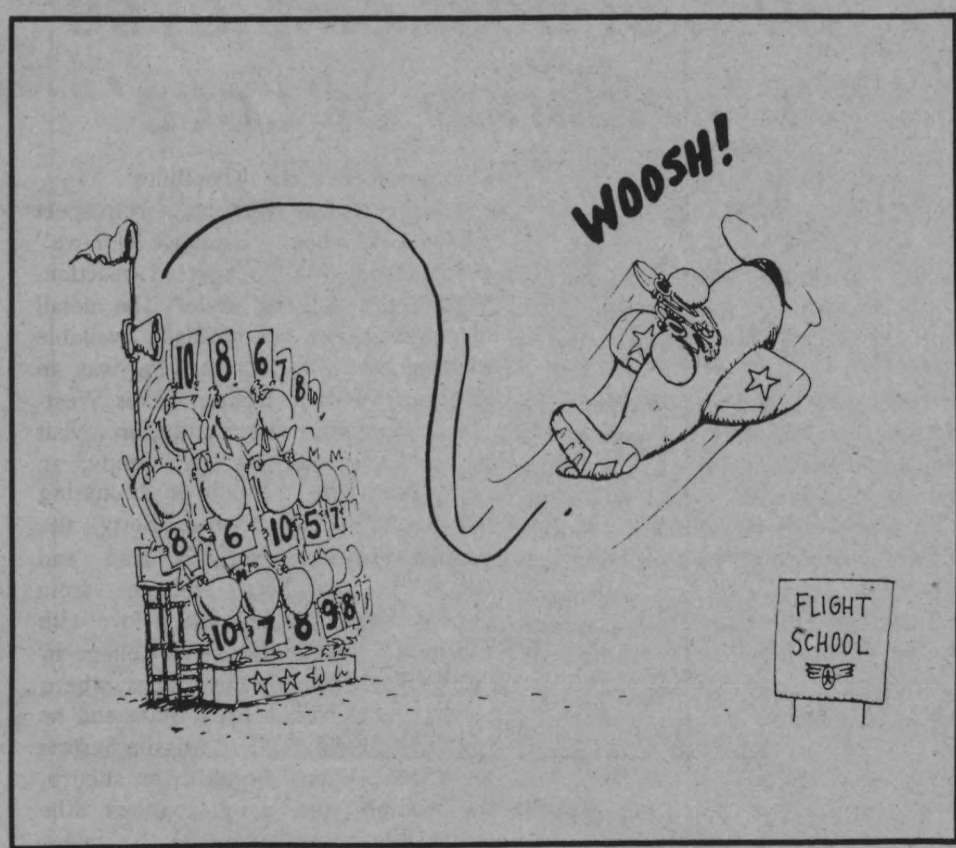
The Army has decided to double-check all positive urine samples using mass spectroscopy, a Surgeon General initiative that should be fully implemented during fiscal year 1985. Kerr said the Army plans to purchase 12 testing devices at a total cost of \$1 to \$1.2 million.

The sensitive mass spectroscopy test will let the Army confirm THC use at lower concentrations that with the gas-liquid chromatography test.

Another initiative Kerr discussed is the Army's decision to gear back up to 800,000 tests annually, the number of tests that were being done prior to September 1983.

He added the Army will test all urine samples for THC (the active ingredient in marijuana) and cocaine, and will spot test samples for other drugs.

Kerr said a civilian consultant will be hired to review lab procedures. A group of civilian scientists completed such a review in June 1984. (ARNews)

Some Morale Support activity charges upped

To continue to offer the services, activities, and events through Morale Support Activities, it is necessary to increase the fees and charges in some of the programs. New fees for Bowling and Auto Crafts will become effective Sept. 1, and the fees for Equipment Issue will become effective Oct. 1.

Almost all Morale Support Activities receive at least partial funding from appropriated funds (funds allocated by Congress in the Defense Budget) but to maintain facilities and provide services and activities for the WSMR community, this money must be supplemented with non-appropriated funds (NAF) which basically come from user fees and small profits for goods and services.

For years most Army recreational

activities were provided either at no cost to the user or with minimal charges. Golf, Bowling and Arts and Crafts resale were about the only things for which users were charged. Even when installations received NAF money in the form of dividends from the profits of the Army Air Force Exchange System (AAFES), as early as the mid-70's most installations were required to have fees and charges for some activities to keep them in operation. This continued until the early 80's when installations were then required to rely on money from Locally Generated Income (LGI) for operational costs and minor improvements. Army installations no longer receive what became known as "PX dividends."

Due to the poor condition of many recreational facilities or lack of facilities

worldwide, it was decided to retain AAFES profits at Department of the Army to be used for major NAF construction. It was this form of retained money that was used to build our new Youth Activities Center at WSMR.

In order to have money available for major construction, Army installations were instructed to become self-sufficient no later than the start of Fiscal 1984 (Oct. 2 '83). By self-sufficiency, the installation must generate locally NAF money for all operations and for all capital purchases and minor construction which are less than \$300,000. Morale Support Activities receive appropriated funds and as many things are funded with these funds as possible. Even so, additional NAF are needed to buy supplies and prizes, pay people, support

our unit funds, sponsor community events, provide entertainment in the Recreation Center and Youth Activities, pay entry fees for off-post sporting events, replace or increase equipment in Outdoor Recreation and numerous other things for the WSMR community.

To become more self-sufficient installations must increase prices of certain services and goods to generate more income from local sources. The overall objective is to keep at least a 20 percent differential below local commercial costs, and in most cases, the differential is about 50 percent. This is the first price increase for WSMR in three years and the new prices are comparable to, or lower than, other military installations. The new prices are as follows:

Col. Gary Kosmider takes reins of USAISC

Col. Gary Kosmider assumed command of U.S. Army Information Systems Command - White Sands, on June 22. He succeeded Col. Tom Spears, who was assigned to Fort Huachuca, Ariz.

In describing his new position, Kosmider explains that "this activity is engaged in complex technical support matters. My job as manager is being able to direct the resources I've been provided."

Insuring that agency managers have the required resources and working environment for maximum efficiency is one of Kosmider's principal concerns. He feels that removing impediments to the operation is the basis for effective administration and that the people actually doing the job usually know it best.

"Ninety percent of the problems

on my desk are people problems" said Kosmider. "They have nothing directly to do with the mission of the agency, but because they affect the morale of the individuals concerned, they indirectly affect the productivity and efficiency of the agency."

Kosmider was born Feb. 19, 1937 in Long Beach, Calif., the son of a Navy enlisted man. He received a competitive Sons of Deceased Veterans appointment to the United States Military Academy and entered West Point in 1954. Upon graduating in 1958, he was commissioned second lieutenant, Signal Corps.

Subsequent to graduation Kosmider attended the Signal Officer Basic Course at Fort Monmouth, N.J., and received airborne training at Fort Benning, Ga.

In June 1965 he graduated with a master's degree in electrical engineering from Northeastern University in Boston. He then attended the Associate Advanc-

ed Course at Fort Monmouth, N.J.

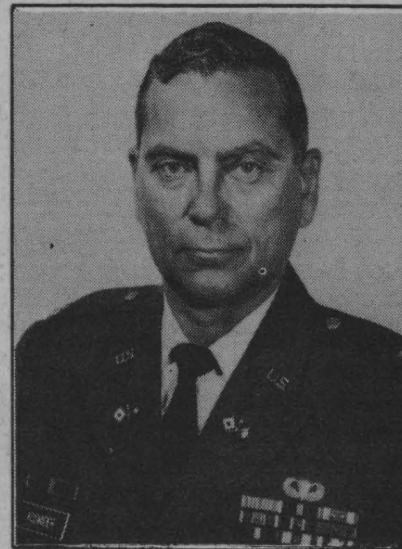
Prior to his assignment on WSMR Kosmider was assigned as assistant chief of staff for automation management, Headquarters, Eighth U.S. Army, in Seoul, Korea. He also had overseas assignments in Turkey, Germany and Vietnam.

Kosmider's awards include the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star, three Meritorious Service Medals, two Army Commendation Medals, the Airborne Qualification Badge, and the DA Staff Identification Badge. He has also received three awards from the Freedom's Foundation.

Microwave oven storing, shipping hints given

If you own a microwave oven, moving, shipping, and storing it can be easy and safe if you follow a few simple instructions.

The Military Traffic Management Command recommends you pack your microwave oven in its original shipping carton when moving or stor-

ing it, because the specially designed molded styrofoam or cardboard inserts will prevent shifting or movement in transit.

Nothing should be packed inside the oven. Cooking containers, glass shelves and other items should be removed

and packed in a separate carton.

If you no longer have the original container, ask the mover to provide a sturdy carton that is well padded to protect knobs, glass doors and dials. Tape the door shut with strong packing tape to provide added strength

to the glass.

Although microwave ovens require no special handling, avoid placing heavier items on top of them. Long term storage will not adversely affect the oven if it is packed properly.

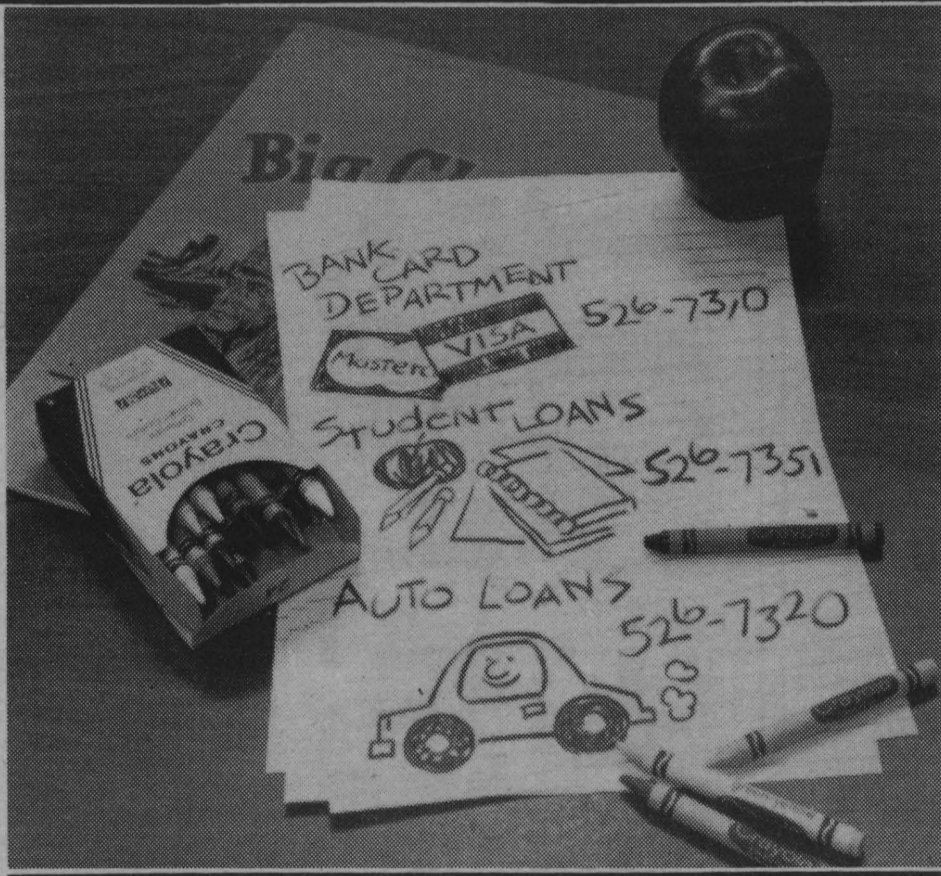
If the oven has been damaged in transit, don't

use it. Call an authorized dealer or repair shop. It is also good practice to have the oven inspected for leakage by a professional after each move, or every few years. Although you can do this yourself, it can be expensive if you don't already own the proper tools. (AFPS)

Quality child development options goal of CDS

from the Child Development Services

The Child Development Service (CDS) is a network of systems and programs through which the Army provide quality child development options that reduce the conflict between parental responsibilities and unit mission requirements. Changes in demographics, coupled with an increase in working spouses and the frequent relocation of service families have made CDS operations a necessity.

Off - post civilian child care programs are inaccessible, unaffordable, and have limited operating hours. Many of these lack programs for infants or toddlers and many do not offer hourly services.

CDS is offered as a supplement to, not a substitute for the family as the primary agent for the care and development of the child. Quality CDS options can strengthen and sustain the child-and-parent relationships. However, the Army and parent must form a partnership to ensure that these options for care will exist.

CDS offers care options with various types of service, locations, hours of operation, and fee schedules that are

responsive to the needs of WSMR families living both on and off - post:

Center - based, Full - Day services in building 501, offer closely monitored and structured group experiences relevant to the age and development of the child. The capacity for the Full - Day Center is 105 children: therefore, the center maintains a waiting list for vacancies. In priority, the following sponsors are eligible for CDS programs in the continental United States (CONUS):

- Active duty and retired military personnel and their families

- Members of the military reserve components on continuous active duty or active duty for training and their families.

- Widows, widowers, and other next of kin of military personnel who were on active or retired at time of death.

- Next of kin to prisoner of war or missing in action (POW/MIA) personnel of all Armed Services.

- DOD civilian personnel employed on the installation/community where local civilian resources are not available, and it is in the interest of the Army.

Quarters - based Family Child Care (FCC) services within certified homes in government quarters offers family atmosphere with limited number of children, flexible hours, and the capacity of addressing special needs. Caregivers are required to attend various developmental and safety classes provided by CDS before they are certified. The purpose of this program is to broaden the CDS service to the community and to provide developmental care to children waiting for a vacancy in the Full - Day Program. Names and addresses of caregivers and FCC applications may be obtained at the Child Development Center, building 501.

A Preschool Program is also available for three and four - year - old children for a two - hour period in the morning or afternoon, Monday through Friday during the school season.

Renovations of the present facility and a wing of the main post chapel will soon be underway. The hourly and part - day programs will relocate to the chapel following renovation completion.

Small game info distributed

The Department of Game and Fish this week is distributing information sheets detailing the 1984-85 small game seasons, which open for dove and band-tailed pigeon Sept. 1.

The sheets will be available at game department offices in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Raton, Roswell and Las Cruces, and from about 350 vendors statewide.

Seasons open statewide Sept. 1 for mourning and white-winged dove. Limits are 15 per day, 30 in possession. Season also opens in most areas of the state Sept. 1 for band-tailed pigeons, with limits of five per day, 10 in possession. Season is not open on band-tailed pigeons in the southwestern quadrant of the state until Oct. 1.

Statewide seasons on quail and snipe opens Sept. 8. Limits on quail are 25 per day or in possession. Limits on snipe is eight per day, 16 in possession.

Season opens Sept. 8 for blue-winged, green-winged and cinnamon teal in the Central Flyway. Limits are four per day, eight in possession. Teal hunters are restricted to use of steel shot in the middle Rio Grande Valley, near La Cueva in northeastern New Mexico, on designated portions of Bitter Lakes and Las Vegas national wildlife refuges and in the Santa Fe spillway basin marsh at Cochiti Lake. A flyer explaining steel-shot zones will be available from the department before Sept. 1. The small game information sheet also delineates steel-shot boundaries.

All classes are taught at studios in the Mesilla Community Center, 1 1/2 blocks west of the Mesilla Town Square on Calle de Santiago.

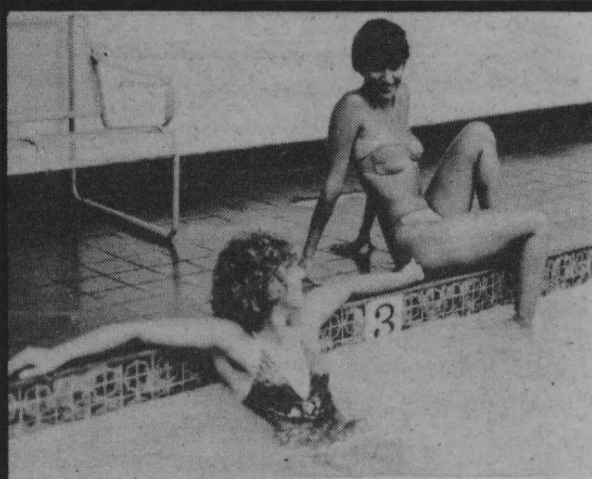

Limited duty profiles being studied

Soldiers with physical profiles limiting duty performance will now be evaluated and some could face separation under a new regulation, according to officials at the Military Personnel Center.

New Army Regulation 600-60, The Physical Performance Evaluation System, is designed to ensure all soldiers can do their jobs under field conditions anywhere in the world.

As of July 1, MOS/Medical Retention Boards screen all soldiers holding Level Three physical profiles. The post-level screening boards now certify whether a soldier is deployable.

The initial screening board may retain soldiers in their present specialty or reclassify them. It also has the option to put soldiers on a six-month probation, during which commanders submit evaluations after 90 days, say Army personnel officials. While the board may refer soldiers to the physical disability system, it will make no decisions concerning separation from the Army.

Soldiers determined not fit for "Worldwide deployability" could be reclassified into a different job or referred into the Army Physical Disability System for further evaluation and possible separation from the Army.

Results of a two-month test evaluation of the new procedures at Fort Riley, Kan., in Germany and Korea, show that

most soldiers are retained in their current specialties, officials report. Only a few were referred for possible separation or reclassification.

The new system also ends the practice of soldiers signing medical condition statements allowing them to continue their present duty assignments within the limits of their profiles.

"In the past, most soldiers signed a medical condition statement and performed within the limits of their physical profiles," said Maj. Stephen T. Young of the Army Personnel Center Physical Disability Branch. "But some couldn't have performed the full range of their jobs anywhere they may have been assigned."

The board will review all soldiers who carry physical profiles with a numerical factor of three in one or more of the Army physical profile serial, or "PULHES," factors. Soldiers who receive a physical profile of four will still be referred for physical disability processing.

Within the physical disability system, a physical evaluation board will determine physical fitness — the ability to do one's job. The board may recommend separation from the Army if a soldier cannot reasonably perform the full range of duties required by MOS/Specialty.

Under the new regulation, the screening boards will consist of a colonel or lieutenant colonel medical officer, two

lieutenant colonels, a sergeant major and a personnel officer.

Continued from page 1 in the first launch of a missile from a submerged submarine.

In Germany Steinhoff was in charge of the planning, development and testing of guidance and automatic controls for missiles. When he came to White Sands in 1945 he continued with work on control and guidance systems for missiles. He was also put in charge of the operation of the flight termination system for V-2 missile firings in 1946 and early 1947.

In 1949 Steinhoff moved to Holloman Air Force Base but continued to work closely with the range. He was involved in planning the early range instrumentation to support missile firings from Holloman. This included work on the procedures and actual surveying of White Sands. This work was crucial because data accuracy is dependent on knowing exactly where each recording instrument is located.

Steinhoff is also noted for his early work in real time computing for missile flight guidance and control. This led to real time processing of data from range instrumentation for instantaneous displays of information. This is now considered essential for insuring the safety of any missile firing.

Steinhoff retired from federal service in 1972 when he was chief scientist at the Air Force Missile Development Center, Holloman Air Force Base.

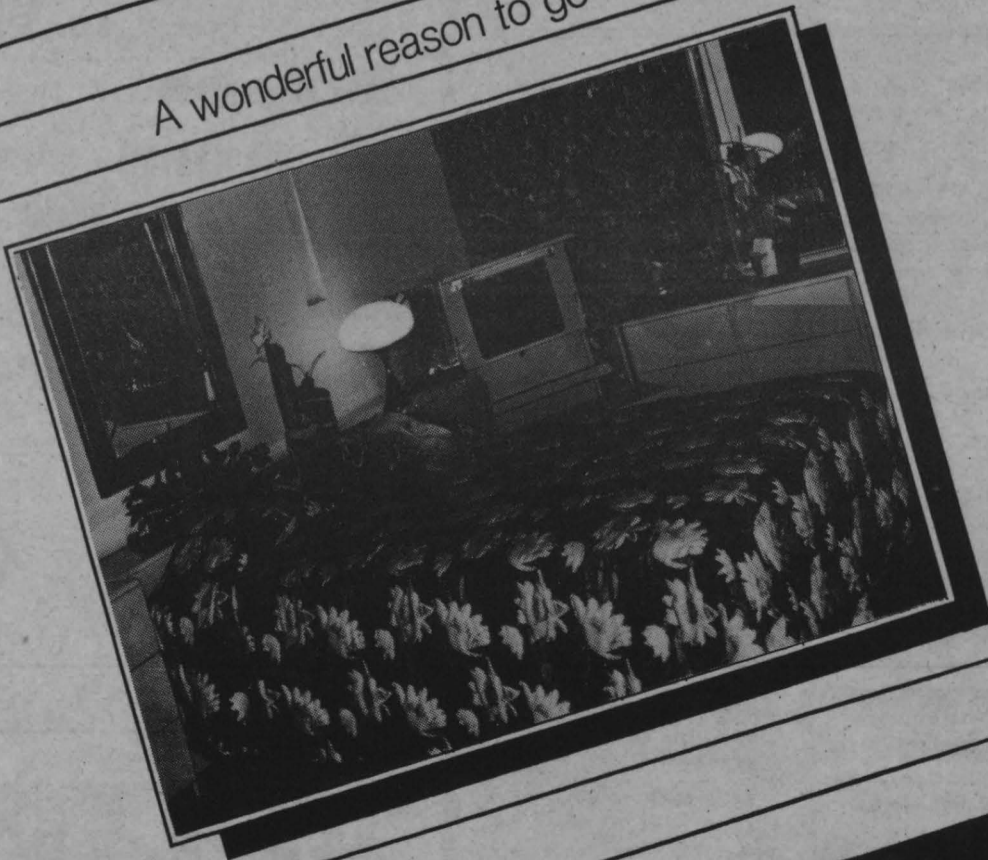

Dental hygienist gives brush, brushing hints

Toothbrushing will remove plaque and other debris from the outer, inner, and biting surfaces of the teeth, and a number of different toothbrushing methods are acceptable.

Ask your dentist to recommend a toothbrush. Most dentists prescribe a brush with a straight handle, flat brushing surface, and soft, end-rounded bristles. Soft bristles are less likely to injure gum tissues.

The head of the brush should be small enough to let you reach every tooth. Children need smaller brushes than those designed for adults. The best method for

an adult is to have a child and adult toothbrush. That way, all tooth areas that a toothbrush will cover can be reached.

A worn-out toothbrush will not properly clean teeth. Replaced your brush often. A toothbrush will only clean one or two teeth at a time. Change its position frequently. Brush gently and with very short strokes, but use enough pressure so that you feel the bristles against the gum.

While it's better to brush several times a day, be sure to brush (and floss) at least once every day so you can prevent plaque damage. If you notice any repeated discomfort or bleeding while brushing, consult your dentist.

After 35 years

Fickes will retire today

William Fickes, technical director and deputy commander of the Information Systems Command will retire today after 35 years of service at WSMR.

Fickes arrived at WSMR as a private first class in 1949. He left the military in 1952 as a sergeant first class to become a GS-05 electronics engineer with the Frequency Coordination Section. Eight years later he rose to the grade of GS-14, and in 1981 became the technical director and deputy commander of USAISC. Such success may be attributed to his philosophy:

"I am not satisfied today with what I did yesterday, and I am not satisfied tomorrow with what I did today. There's always room for improvement."

Drug offenses viewed more harshly overseas

offense here (the United States) may be a major crime in a foreign country, with the

criminal penalties to go with it."

And once servicemen enter the criminal justice system in another country, they may find that their rights under the U.S. law don't automatically apply.

"American citizens don't carry the laws of the United States or the Constitution of the United States with them when they travel overseas," says Weeks. "If an American runs afoul of the law in a foreign country, he or she may well have to deal with the laws of that country notwithstanding any treaties or agreements that may be in force."

And some of those laws regarding punishments are pretty tough.

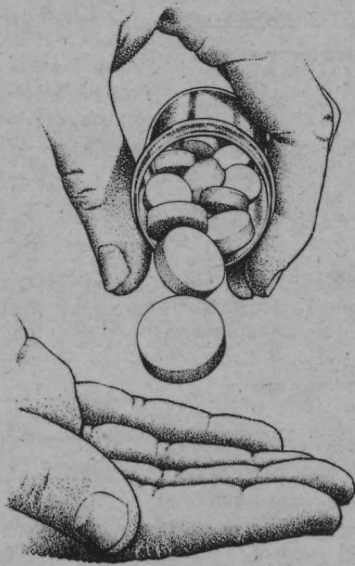
In the Republic of Korea, trafficking in marijuana means a sentence of from one year to life.

Any person involved in producing, exporting or importing prohibited substances in Turkey can get anywhere from five years to life. If a military person is convicted of using minors in any aspect of narcotics trafficking or if a person is convicted of attempting to addict minors, the judge may impose a life sentence.

Simple possession of marijuana in Japan could result in up to five years in prison.

In Greece there is a two year minimum sentence for possession of drugs for personal use.

Under German law, the maximum penalty for simple possession for personal use is four years in prison or a fine. The maximum for trafficking in drugs is fifteen years or a fine, depending on the circumstances.



Near the end of last year, there were 116 American servicemen, Department of Defense civilians or family members of servicemen confined in foreign prisons. Of those, 30 had been found guilty of drug charges. The longest sentence for drugs handed down to an American serviceman overseas was in Thailand where an Army Specialist Five was given 33 years and four months for heroin smuggling.

"Drug offenses are usually viewed much more harshly abroad," says Richard Weeks of the State Department's Bureau of Consular Affairs, adding "what may be considered a minor
